**North Shore Line
Asks Permission
to Keep Low Fare**

Apparently satisfied with the volume of business it has done since experimental low passenger fares were inaugurated, the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroad has asked the interstate commerce commission for permission to extend the low rate schedule for another six months.

Under the old rate, passenger fares on the North Shore line amounted to 3 1/2 cents a mile, while only two cents is charged under the rate now in force.

The experimental rate was to have expired on March 31 and will be discarded unless the commerce commission approves the request of railroad officials.

Rates to Chicago are now 47c one way and 85c for a round trip, while the fare to Milwaukee is \$1.20 one way and \$2.20 for a round trip.
