

**"The Great Waltz" at The Auditorium**

"The Great Waltz," probably the most heroic musical production the theatre has yet boasted, is now playing at the Auditorium theatre. The Auditorium is ideal for this mammoth musical spectacle from the Center theatre, Radio City, New York—both because of its exceptionally large stage and because—although the capacity is large there is an unusual intimacy to the theatre. Considerable difficulty has been encountered in staging "The Great Waltz" but the only alteration it required here was a new switchboard and the installation of additional electrical current.

The success of "The Great Waltz" is in keeping with its mammoth proportions, and Max Gordon's determination to present the huge spectacle west of the Hudson river would seem to be a wise bit of managerial judgment.

Max Gordon, who presented "Roberta," "Dodsworth," "Three's a Crowd," and many other of the theatre's most notable successes, presents "The Great Waltz." The production was conceived and directed by Hassard Short; the music is from the works of Johann Strauss, Sr. and Jr. The dances, including the superb ballet, were staged by Albertina Rasch. The scenery was designed by Albert Johnson, and Doris Zinkeisen created the costumes.

The musical play was first presented in Vienna. It was presented in London as "Waltzes from Vienna," where it ran for nearly two years. Mr. Gordon obtained the American rights and produced "The Great Waltz" especially for Radio City. Because of its hugeness it was said it could not be seen elsewhere. Mr. Gordon was determined that it should. A staff worker all summer obtaining data on various stages throughout the country, and a tour of principal cities boasting large auditoriums is the result.

"The Great Waltz" is a musical love story having to do with the rivalry of the two Strausses, father and son, and the struggle of the younger Strauss for the title of "Waltz King," and the romance of the youthful Strauss with Resi, the charming daughter of a pastry shopkeeper, who finally gives him to the world for his music.

Marion Claire, who created the role of Resi, sweetheart of young Strauss, has been especially engaged to sing the part here. Guy Robertson is Johann Strauss, Jr.; Gladys Baxter is Countess Baranska, his royal patroness; Charles Romano plays Johann Strauss, Sr. Other important roles are indicated by Solly Ward, Sam Mann, Gladys Clark, Stanley Harrison, Ralph Magelsen. Vivian Fay is prima ballerina, and there is a large chorus of trained, mixed voices, an elaborate ballet, and augmented orchestras.

"The Great Waltz" is to be seen nightly, except Sundays, with matinees on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

**S. H. Hansen Enters Race for Congress**
