Morning Mail Delivered Half Hour Earlier

Daniel A. Cobb, who recently succeeded Hugo L. Schneider as postmaster, has arranged that the morning mail delivery is made half an hour earlier than hitherto. This is done by eliminating the distribution of periodicals and limiting the morning delivery to first class mail.

Postmaster Cobb stated that next month the regular semi-annual inspection of the routes of carriers will be made and he is hopeful that following this inspection he will be able to increase the number of postmen. If the number of carriers allowed the Highland Park office is increased, it will be possible to deliver mail to a number of outlying districts that do not have deliveries at present.
