

Captain John Evans Dies in Washington

News of the death of Captain John M. Evans which occurred January 26th in Washington, D.C., has just reached this office. Capt. Evans, who served in the Finance department of the Infantry was the husband of Mrs. Elizabeth Doty Evans, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Doty of this city. They were married nine years, October 8. Besides his wife Mr. Evans leaves three children, a daughter Patricia aged eight and twins, Topsy and Eva, aged 3 1/2 years.

He had been ordered to Fort in Houston, Texas and was to go there in February.

Funeral services were held January 28th with interment in Arlington cemetery.

Mrs. Evans is living in Savannah, Ga., with her children.

Rites Held Tuesday for Julius Goldberg

Funeral services for Julius A. Goldberg 57, of 211 Vine avenue, Highland Park, who died last Thursday at Miami Beach, Florida, were held Tuesday of this week at 2:30 p.m. in the chapel of the Rosehill cemetery. Mr. Goldberg is survived by his wife, Josephine, and a daughter, Mrs. George Block.

Mr. Goldberg had been in failing health for several months and went to Florida, accompanied by Mrs. Goldberg and their only daughter, Mrs. George D. Block, less than

two weeks ago in the hope of recovery. He was apparently making progress toward better health when he was suddenly stricken with heart disease.

Born in New York, Mr. Goldberg came to Chicago as a boy. He started his business career as a window designer shortly after the 1893 world's fair. For a time he was employed in the old Rupert's shoe store, where he met a fellow employee, John O'Connor. In 1903 they formed their firm, starting with a single store at Clark and Madison streets. Mr. O'Connor is president of the company.

Deerfield To Have Another Tavern

An ordinance limiting the village to two taverns was recently passed, but Mr. Easton's application was presented before the ordinance became effective.

Deerfield R.N.A. Celebrates Birthday

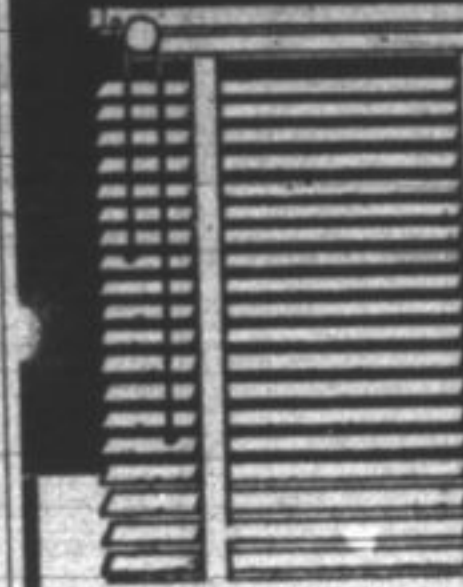
