

**Suburban Entries Take Ribbons at Chicago Flower Show**

Entries from Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Ravinia, Bannockburn and the North Shore Garden club were recipients of ribbons at the tenth annual flower show of the Garden Club of Illinois, which is being held this week at the Navy Pier in Chicago.

Chief among the awards presented was the silver plaque, only one of which is given each year by the Garden Club of America, which this year has been given to the four clubs who jointly exhibited the French regency house and its accompanying gardens. The pebbled court and entrance with azaleas in a formal half circle arrangement was planned by the Lake Forest club who worked in conjunction with the Garden clubs of Kenilworth, Winnetka and Evanston. Mrs. Donald P. Welles chaired the Lake Forest committee.

All three awards in the class of flower arrangements in oblong or round containers with approximately three-fourths of the water exposed went to Lake county exhibitors, the North Shore Garden club, Mrs. Ernest G. Loeb of Highland Park, chairman, and Mrs. Julius Rosenwald of Ravinia club, president, placing first, showing a brass bowl with an arrangement of a seedum, an orchid and some fleshy foliage. Second place went to the Lake Bluff club for its yellow jonquils, white pine needles and willow twigs in a pewter bowl, while Bannockburn placed third with an arrangement of yellow and purple Japanese iris in a modern pewter bowl.

For its delightful small green house with potted geraniums, marguerites, cactae and pansies, the Ravinia club won a blue ribbon. Members of the club arranging this major entry were the Mes. Nichols, E. E. Leonard, H. H. Small, P. D. Stakes, E. A. Harrison, Stanley Grace, Eugene C. Pfister, William F. Salem, and Robert Bryant.

In the buffet table competition the Ravinia club won still another award with its table bringing the spirit of old Mexico into play. The cloth is hand loomed and patterned in gray colors, hand-made plates and bowls are used, and center appointments of modern ornamental tin from Mexico add a decorative touch. The exhibit was judged third in its class.

Lake Bluff won a special award (purple ribbon and the highest award made) for its indoor window box of white primroses. The window box is white metal in a neo-classic design. Curtaining the window are white dotted panels swagged and held with self material tiebacks. The green of the plant foliage lends the only color note. Mrs. V. W. Behel Jr., is president of the club.

Students of Lake Forest academy executed a modern desk and chair in such a manner as to win a special award. The combined desk and book shelves is built of maple and held together with bolts which form something of a decorative motive. The chair is covered in natural colored loosely woven material.

**Harold D. Kelsey Is Candidate for Coroner**

By studying the causes of death and giving full time to the office of county coroner, the automobile death rate can be cut appreciably. A Lake County in the opinion of Harold D. Kelsey, of Barrington, Republican candidate for coroner at the April 14 primaries.

In many cases, he pointed out, recommendations could be made to the proper governing bodies such as illustrated in the Knollwood case so as to eliminate future traffic deaths.

In the 102 counties in Illinois there are 88 counties that do not have a physician as a coroner. Only 14 of the counties use physicians as coroners.

Electing a doctor is a useless gesture that saves no money, according to supporters of Kelsey. Only in cases where a post mortem is necessary is a surgeon called and these comprise less than 10 per cent of the cases coming before a coroner. Even when a post mortem is held the coroner, should he be a physician, cannot hold it but shall call in another physician under the state law, Kelsey supporters contend. The coroner simply acts as the investigator to the cause of the death, conducts the hearing, and then sends the report to the state.

Kelsey has pledged himself at various political meetings that he will call in the nearest physician to make autopsies if necessary.

In his year as chairman of the Lake County Board of Supervisors, which was 1934, Kelsey started the fiscal year with an overdraft of \$184,110.14. By the end of the year his chairmanship the overdraft was reduced to \$31,775.83, or a saving of \$152,334.31 to the county in one year.

That record, his friends declare, is the best answer to his ideas of economy in government so as to reduce taxes and still provide adequate service to the public.

When he was a member of the Lake County Board of Review, which analyzes the reports of all of the township assessors, reductions of approximately \$7,500,000 were ordered on as assessed valuation of property. At the same time the county tax rate was decreased 10 cents on the \$100 assessed valuation.

In Cuba township, in which Barrington is the largest center, Supervisor Kelsey is regarded so highly, his supporters aver, that he will come out of that district with more than 1,000 votes to spare over opponents.
