Medical Society To Meet in Springfield in April

Officers and councilors of the Illinois State Medical society announce that the 86th annual meeting of the society will be held in Springfield, Illinois on May 19, 20, 21. Physicians of Springfield are making all of the local arrangements for meetings and social activities.

There will be extensive and unusual scientific exhibits presented by some of the larger hospitals, medical schools and individual physicians. All of the latest medical equipment will be displayed in the commercial exhibit hall by manufacturers of medical supplies.

The scientific programs will be given in sectional meetings, classified according to the specialties. Programs will be given of particular interest to the surgeon, the internist, the pediatrician, ophthalmologist, the public health worker, etc. At the Tuesday afternoon meeting of the House of Delegates, the governing body of the Illinois State

Medical society, Dr. Charles B. Reed of Chicago, president, will preside. Reports of all officers, committees and councilors will be given. Problems facing the practice of medicine, will also be brought up for discussion.

Dr. Harold M. Camp of Monmouth is secretary of this society, which is one of the largest and oldest state medical societies in the country.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the society will also hold its annual meeting concurrently with the doctors meeting. Several hundred doctors' wives are expected to attend.
