Lyons To Try Again To Reduce Auto Fees To \$3 for All Cars

Not at all disturbed because he house refused to pass his bill to cut the annual license to a three dollar flat rate, Rep. Richard J. Lyons said today that he will introduce another bill in the next session. While Rep. Lyons is in a great measure responsible for the present small cut in the fees he is not at all satisfied and claims that there still can be a deep reduction, possibly to \$5 which he states is enough for the state.

Said Rep. Lyons: "I will never be satisfied until I get the automobile license plates for all cars reduced to a flat \$3, for I know that is enough to retire the principal and interest on the outstanding bonds which were issued for the building of roads and for no other purpose. Why should a motorist, and particularly the workingman or the average fellow be buying license plates for large sums of money when it goes to other purposes than what it was originally intended for?"

He continued: "We may have to reduce to \$5 first for a while, but it must come down to what many other states charge, and that is \$3 flat. We had a terrible fight over the small reduction that is now in effect, and many administration leaders were opposed to the paltry sum cut from last year's fee."

"I'm for a real reduction and the sooner the fellow driving a car gets behind this movement the sooner we will accomplish our objective."

By early feeding, I mean just as soon as the frost is out of the ground the first two or three inches. After you've given the grass a square meal you can wait a bit, till the soil is completely thawed out and dry enough to work. Then go after the places where the grass was killed last summer. Try to analyze each spot and see what caused the trouble. If the soil had too much clay in it, so that it baked hard and dry, spade in some sand or finely-sifted ashes to loosen it up. If on the other hand it was too sandy, so that it couldn't hold water enough for the grass, you can fix it by mixing in heavy black loam, or peat moss, or well-decayed mulch, such as last year's dead leaves and grass clippings. Then mix in some complete plant food. If you're working on small patches of ground, use about one heaping tablespoonful of food to every square foot. On larger areas you can figure two quarts to every 100 square feet. Mix it well into the soil, working it down three or four inches into the ground. Then apply your grass seed, using the very best seed you can and plenty of it. Rake the seed lightly into the soil and water gently but thoroughly—and don't let the soil ever get really dry until the new grass is growing strongly.
