**Daniel B. Cox Buried on Monday, March 30th**

Funeral services were held Monday, March 30, 1936 in Kenosha, for Daniel B. Cox, formerly of Highland Park. He passed away at St. Catherine's hospital in Kenosha March 26, after an illness of several weeks.

Since 1903 he had been employed at the American Brass Co. as construction superintendent and was one of their most popular employees.

Mr. Cox spent his boyhood in Highland Park, going to Kenosha in 1897. In May 1899 he was married to Lena C. Burg at Holy Name cathedral in Chicago.

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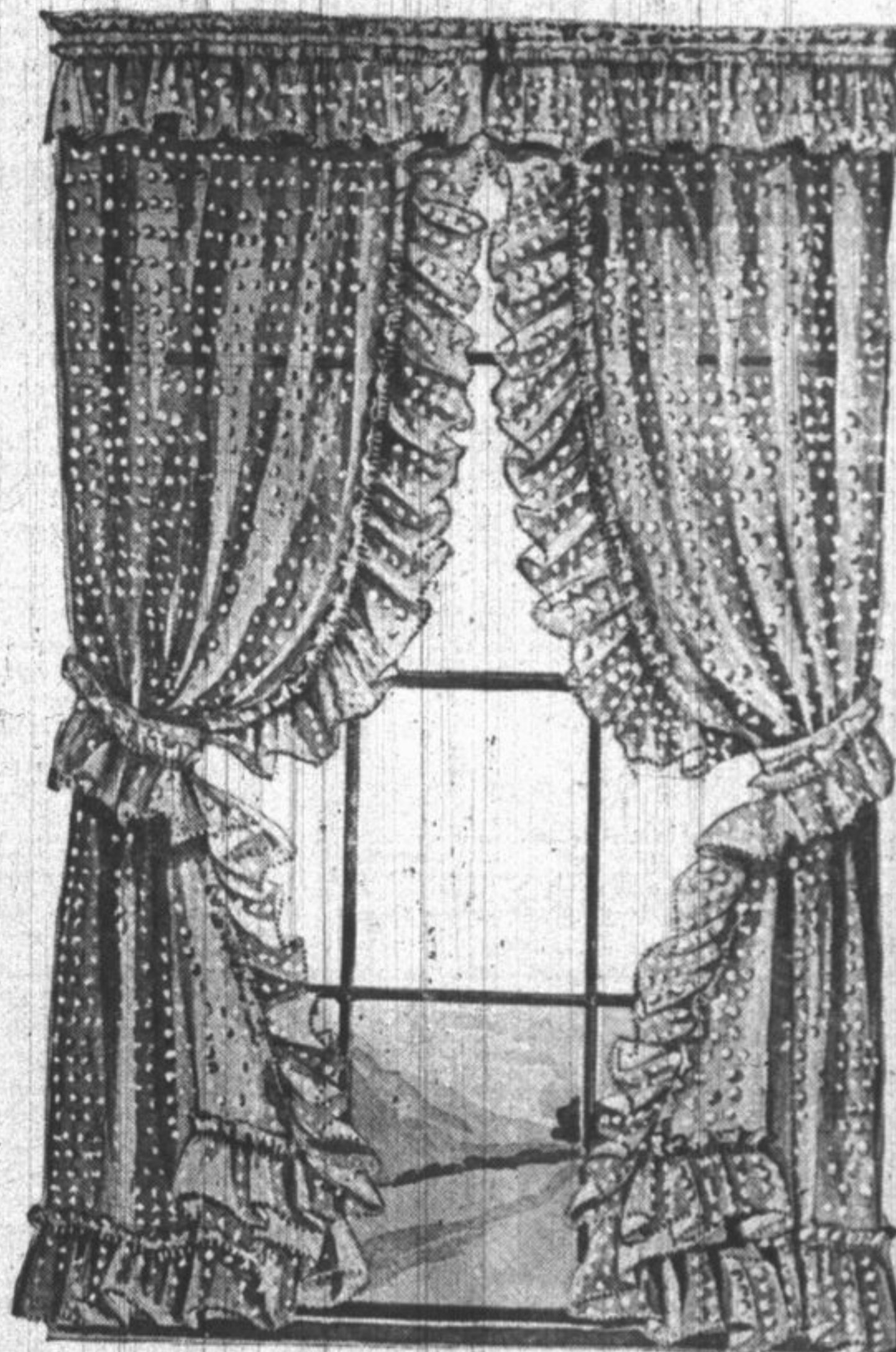
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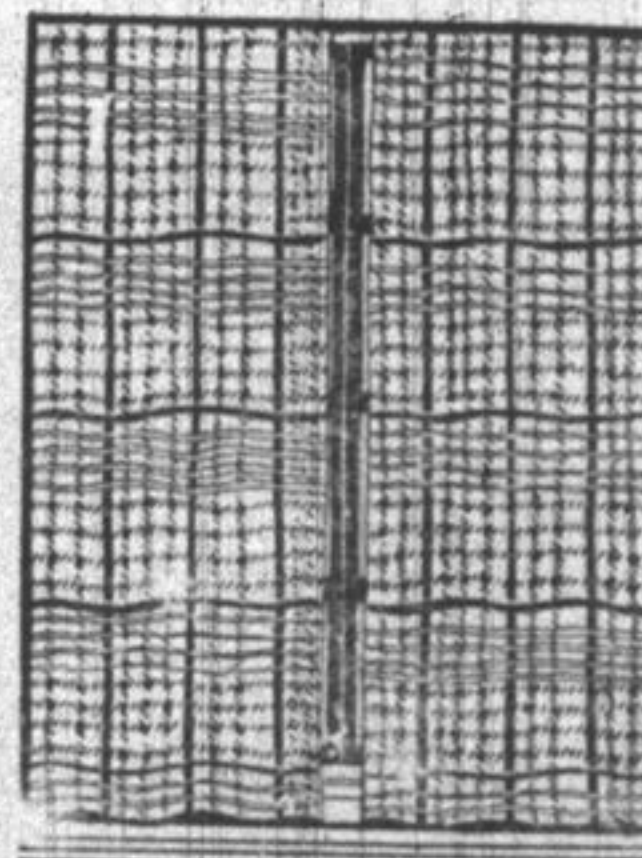
