

# The Recipe Box

The job of eliminating the entries sent in to "The Press Recipe Contest" is at hand and within a short time we will be able to announce the winners. The recipes are being carefully graded for cost as the first procedure in the elimination, then for simplicity in making, and last for appeal and attractiveness. When all entries have been classified in this manner, we will publish the names and address of winners.

I've been experimenting with some Crushed Dates in Champagne Brandy, received from the Garden of the Setting Sun, in Mecca, California. Many delicious new ideas have presented themselves to me and in future issues, I'll tell you all about them. My new "Clubhouse Pie" is an ideal dessert.

Several persons have called me and asked that I tell about the salads that I made at the Symphony theatre, (on the west side) last Friday on the Prudence Penny's Homemaker's club. Here are a few:

**PINEAPPLE SANDWICH SALAD**  
Make a bed of lettuce on salad plate, place on it a slice of well drained pineapple, over this spread a liberal amount of tuna fish which has been marinated in thousand island dressing, on top place another slice of pineapple and in the hole place dash of mayonnaise. Sprinkle with paprika if desired.

**TOMATO DELIGHT**  
On a bed of lettuce or curled endive, place three slices of firm fresh tomatoes, about 1/4 inch thick, cover with mayonnaise and sprinkle finely

chopped peanuts on top.  
**FIBBER MCGEE SALAD**  
Place curled endive on a salad platter and on this, mound a can of Larsen's Veg-all or other salad vegetables. Over this, using a pastry bag or tube, run a few lines of mayonnaise attractively over it.

**POINSETTA SALAD**  
Take a firm fresh tomato and carefully score it down sides as to make five petals of flower, being careful not to cut through center or bottom, bend down these scored petals and on them place a green asparagus tip. Between each petal using a pastry tube or bag, make a small rosette, on top of center of tomato, place a large rosette, all made of mayonnaise.

The other salads made were, Calavo-Tuna Salad and a Fruit Salad, which have appeared in past issues of The Press.

**CRABMEAT CELERY SCALLOP**  
4 tbs. butter  
5 tbs. flour  
1/2 teas. salt  
Few grains pepper  
2 cups milk  
1 1/2 cups flaked crab meat  
1 1/2 cups cooked celery cut in pieces  
Paprika  
Buttered crumbs  
Melt butter, add flour, salt and pepper and mix until smooth. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook until rather thick. Arrange crabmeat and celery in a shallow dish which has been well buttered and pour on the sauce. Sprinkle generously with paprika. Cover with fluffy buttered crumbs. Bake

in moderate oven 375 degrees F. until crumbs are golden brown. Serves 6.

**PRIKOS SUPREME**  
1 lb. fillet of haddock  
3 cups diced potatoes  
medium onion, chopped  
tblsp. olive oil  
tblsp. boiling water  
tblsp. chopped parsley  
tsp. salt  
teas. pepper  
tsp. nutmeg  
teas. paprika

Saute onion and potatoes in hot oil until browned. Add fish which has been cut into small pieces. Pour oil water and seasoning and cover. Steam slowly for 15 minutes. Serve with lemon garnish. Serves 6.

**ILATONNO ALLA BOLOGNESE**  
1 lb. tuna fish in oil  
or 2 branches celery  
White wine  
onions  
garlic, oil  
Chop vegetables and cook in oil until tender, add fish, cut in pieces and a few tbs. white wine. Simmer for about 1 hour. Serve at once.

## Riders Trapped on Railroad Trestle

Miss Grace Riemer, 920 Rice street, Highland Park and her companion, William Wintelborn, 1711 Lake street, Evanston, nearly lost their lives last Sunday when, while out horseback riding, they were trapped on a railway trestle.

They had rented two horses at the Waukegan Riding stable and set out for a canter on a path which runs along the Chicago and North Western railroad right of way. Near Greenwood avenue in Waukegan, they came to a place where a trestle carries the tracks over a pond. There was no train in sight and Wintelborn and Miss Riemer de-

cid to risk riding the trestle. The ties were close together and they believed the horses could pick their way across safely. By so doing, they would avoid riding down the embankment and fording the pond. Half way across Miss Riemer's horse got one leg caught between two ties and threw her off. The other horse reared in fright and threw Wintelborn.

At that moment they heard a passenger train roaring down on them from the north. The couple tried frantically to get the horses off the trestle, Wintelborn's finally jumped to safety into the pond but Miss Riemer's could not be freed.

A watchman at the Green wood avenue crossing saw the plight of the couple and ran down the tracks, trying to flag the train. Wintelborn and Miss Riemer ran off the trestle and watched the train rush by, crushing the trapped horse to death.

## Rifle and Pistol Club Hears Major Parker

Members and friends of the Sheridan Rifle and Pistol club were entertained by Major Parker Jr., director of the National Rifle association, at the club's first anniversary dinner held in honor of its third birthday, at Witten's hall on Wednesday evening, March 21.
