

### PLANS COMPLETED FOR ARMY DAY AT FORT SHERIDAN

one of the most attractive events scheduled for the day's activities. In addition, this squadron will have a display of troopers' mounts and equipment, which will include rifles, spears, pistols, machine guns and armored scout cars. The 2nd Battalion, 3rd Field Artillery, commanded by Major C. S. Richards, will have a 3 inch gun battery set up in firing position with horse-drawn guns and caissons and the latest signal communications equipment. This equipment includes telephone, telegraph and the newest radio equipment developed for the Army. The 61st Coast Artillery (AA), commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Chas. B. Meyer, will have on display their anti-aircraft 3

inch guns, 30 and 50 calibre anti-aircraft guns with all of their range finding and firing devices. Also on display will be an exhibit arranged by the OCC, Medical corps and the Chemical Warfare service.

The Bakers and Cooks school, which had a very popular exhibit last year, will again arrange an interesting display, based on the theory that an army travels on its stomach. Major Dover Bell, QMC, Asst. Commandant of the school, will have on display a large assortment of foodstuffs as prepared in garrison and in the field.

The barracks of the Bakers and Cooks school, Troop "A", 14th Cavalry, Headquarters Battery, 61st Coast Artillery (AA), "D" Company, 2nd Infantry, "E" Battery, 3rd Field Artillery will be thrown open for inspection and guides will be provided to escort visitors and answer any questions they may care to ask. Parking space for automobiles has been set aside and several thousand people are expected to be present.

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Now I'd like to say a word about rolling a lawn—a subject very few people really understand. A lawn should be rolled just once a year, and there's only one correct time to do it. That's early in the spring, when the ground is just dry enough to be firm after frost has left. Rolling at that time removes the air pockets caused by the frost, and pushes the grass roots back into the soil where they can get nourishment.

Now, about cutting your grass—let it get three inches high in the spring before you cut it the first time. If it's newly planted grass, set your mower to cut no closer than two inches. If it's pretty well established, you can cut it down to use a grass-catcher on your mower; clippings left on the lawn tend to form a sort of mat that hurts the grass.

And now just a word about watering. It's a good idea to water your lawn less frequently and do a more thorough job of it. You see frequent light waterings draw the grass roots up near the surface. Then, when the sun gets good and hot, these shallow roots dry up and die. But if you give the soil a real drenching, get it wet down at least three or four inches, your grass will grow deep, strong roots and will resist hot weather much better.

### Mason Claims Savings During Tenure of Office

Charles E. Mason, Republican candidate for state's attorney, has saved the taxpayers of Lake County vast sums of money during his four years in office, records of the county prove.

"I have worked," he continued, "unceasingly for the best interests of Lake county and my public record, both in civic and fraternal circles, stands unchallenged. Since babyhood I have lived among you. Here I was raised. Here my children were born," Mr. Mason said.
