SCOUT SEMINARS TO ATTRACT NORTH SHORE SCOUTERS

A day of conference and planning and study for local council scouters has been planned by the Regional Boy Scout headquarters for the scouters of this and other councils throughout the 7th Region. The seminars that are planned will have as their leaders four men from the national office: Harvey Gordon, camp engineer; Thomas J. Keane, national director of senior scouting; Charles Miller, assistant director of the division of operations; and Lorne Barclay, national director of the various phases of the scout program coming under his particular leadership. The day when North Shore men are invited to meet with these men is Sunday, April 19 at the North Shore hotel at Evanston. The seminar will begin at 10 a.m. and will continue through till 5 p.m. Full details have been sent to the scouters of the North Shore Area council.

TRAINING COURSE PLANNED

Preliminary plans were sent to scout leaders of the North Shore Area council this week announcing a training course for scout leaders in the elements of scoutmastership. This course will be held on Saturday afternoon, May 2 through till Sunday afternoon, May 3. The course will be held at the Cabin-in-the-Woods. About 25 scouters of the council will act as instructors in the course and attendance of over 30 students is expected. The course will be open to all scoutmasters who have as yet not had this training.

CABIN-THE-WOODS WIRED FOR LIGHTS

The Cabin-in-the-Woods, the scout cabin west of Glenview, in the Forest Preserve, is now equipped with electric lights—portable but sure, but electric just the same. Through the courtesy of Jack Davis, Scoutmaster of Troop 33 the cabin is wired for and equipped with automobile headlights. Any troop or group using the cabin need only take with them a regular storage battery and attach it to the system. There is a light in the kitchen, one in the small room and two in the large room, which is ample light and much more satisfactory than the kerosene lanterns which have been in use. The county Forest Preserve district has recently installed all of the windows which had been broken by vandals and have put on shutters on the outside of the windows as a protection when no one is there.

FIRST AID MEET THIS FRIDAY

The council first aid contest will

be held Friday of this week, April 4, at the gymnasium of St. Joseph's church in Libertyville. Previous announcements said that the meet would be held at the high school in Libertyville on Saturday night, but a number of things made the change to Friday necessary. Ten teams are ready to compete in the event, which is the first of a series of contests to pick the champion first aiders of the middle west. The finals of the mid-west contest will be held at Waukegan on Saturday, April 25. Harry Hall Promises Vice Cleanup in County

Lake county's vice conditions will receive the prompt attention of Harry A. Hall, republican candidate for state's attorney, if he is elected to office, he announced last week as he began the final half of his campaign.

He is strongly opposed to houses of ill fame with their attendant evils and has pledged himself to their immediate abolishment in the county should he become state prosecutor.

"Immoral resorts have a stifling effect upon community life," Mr. Hall declared during his campaign tour in the last several days. "I have set myself the task of closing these places, removing a condition which is looked upon with helpless distaste by all self respecting citizens. If elected state's attorney I will not only close the numerous houses of ill fame in Lake county but what is more to the point will keep them closed. This can be done by the state's attorney if he so chooses. That would constitute one of my first acts after taking office."

In carrying out his appeal for nomination to the citizens of the county, Mr. Hall stressed the fact that he regards his platform pledges as something more than mere detailed political promises to be dis-

carded after the ballots are counted. "The people of Lake County will find me in earnest when I say I will clean up vice conditions," he said. "Also I will be ever ready to listen patiently to all who bring their problems to me. I will conduct the office with dignity and will extend courteous and respectful treatment to everyone. Just complaints will be vigorously and efficiently prosecuted. To allow myself full time for the duties of state's attorney I will sever my connections with the law firm of Hall and Hulse of which I am now a member."
