Harry A. Hall Elected to Office in T.B. Association

Harry A. Hall, Waukegan attorney and candidate for state's attorney in Lake county, was elected vice-president of the Illinois Tuberculosis association at the annual business meeting of that organization held Monday in Decatur.

Mr. Hall is a member of the executive committee of the state tuberculosis association and treasurer of the Lake County Tuberculosis association.

The organization to which he was elected an officer yesterday is the largest volunteer public health agency in the state, with 82 branch associations in as many counties. During the past 25 years, the association has sponsored disease control programs which have reduced tuberculosis from first to seventh place as a cause of death.

The Illinois Tuberculosis association's activities are controlled by a board of 84 directors, selected from all parts of the state. The board is comprised of physicians and interested laymen who devote their time without remuneration to the fight against this disease.
