Wisconsin rose grower appealed to Hearing about this investigation, Dr. Luckhardt began a series of Ravinia Players to Give physiological experiments with the gas. He found that he could anesthetize frogs and dogs, and as a final experiment, had his associate Professor Anton J. Carlson, head of the department of physiology, administer the gas to him in a final experiment in the laboratory one Sunday morning in 1923. This final test proved that the gas was not dangerous to human life, and the new anesthetic quickly was widely accepted. It produces none of the nauseating after-effects of such standard anesthetics as others, and it imposes no strain on the heart or kidneys. Refusing an offer of more than \$100,000 for the patent right to ethylene, Dr. Luckhardt gave the
