Plan Study of Local Conditions To Further Safety of Citizens

Highland Park Leads County In Building

March Total of New Building Reaches High Mark of \$189,362.00

Highland Park was first in building construction during the month of March, both on the North Shore and in Lake county. The leading total of \$189,362 is composed of two sewage disposal plants whose total value is \$108,878 and ten new residences, totaling \$75,159.

This sharp upturn in construction for Highland Park is viewed with great satisfaction, not only by those directly or indirectly connected with the building trades, but by Highland Park merchants as a whole, for it means a substantial increase in local buying power. It is felt that with workers in the building trades, many of whom who have been idle, or nearly so, for a number of years, again working steadily, local business in general should receive a gratifying impetus.

March's total of \$189,362 compares with one of only \$37,000 for March of last year and one of \$18,625 for February of this year.

Dr. Luckhardt Will Lecture at Local Y.W.C.A.

Highland Park League of Women Voters Are Sponsors of Program

Dr. Arno B. Luckhardt, University of Chicago, will speak on "Proposed Food and Drug Legislation" at the Y. W. C. A. on Wednesday, April 22, at 2 p.m., under the auspices of the local League of Women Voters, and make this annual meeting of the league a most outstanding event.

Best known as the discoverer of ethylene gas as an anesthetic, Professor Luckhardt is an exceptionally able physiologist. He has done highly important work on parathyroid functions, tetany, and opinephrin actions, and his influence has been very wide not only in physiology but in medicine and dentistry. His cultural interests are unusually broad, his chief interests being in medical history and the history of science. He collaborated with Dr. James Henry Breasted, director of the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago in annotating the Edwin Smith Surgical Papyrus, an Egyptian scroll which is the earliest known medical treatise of the 17th century, B.C. Professor Luckhardt has served on many important committees for the American Medical Association, and among his many other activities he is councillor on dental therapeutics for the American Dental Association. He also spends much time in a campaign of education in defending of scientific right to animal experimentation, and the essential need of such experimentation for medical progress. Although a leader in the continuous fight against the antivivisectionists, he does not fish or hunt because he regards such activities as cruel, and he regards humanely directed animal experimentation as a scientific necessity in a choice between medical development and animal life. Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Pi medical fraternity established in 1934 an annual lectureship in his honor.

His discovery of ethylene as an anesthetic is an interesting story. A Wisconsin rose grower appealed to the botany department of the University of Chicago for help in ascertaining what made his roses turn yellow. Investigation showed that small amounts of ethylene gas was present in the gas used for fuel in heating the greenhouse, and was escaping into the air. The ethylene, in effect, put the roses to sleep. Hearing about this investigation, Dr. Luckhardt began a series of physiological experiments with the gas. He found that he could anesthetize frogs and dogs, and as a final experiment, had his associate Professor Anton J. Carlson, head of the department of physiology, administer the gas to him in a final experiment in the laboratory one Sunday morning in 1923. This final test proved that the gas was not dangerous to human life, and the new anesthetic quickly was widely accepted. It produces none of the nauseating after-effects of such standard anesthetics as others, and it imposes no strain on the heart or kidneys. Refusing an offer of more than \$100,000 for the patent rights to ethylene, Dr. Luckhardt gave the anesthetic to the world.
