

Deerfield Board Discusses Water Rates

At the regular meeting of the village board of Deerfield on April 14, it was decided that a graduated scale of water rates would be studied with a view to give the larger users of water a cheaper rate in line with the policy of other utility companies.

Reports indicated that vehicle licenses collected to date for the year 1936 amounted to \$1314. Fines collected during the month of March were \$124.

An important change in the business procedure was the decision to have the village clerk read the bills receivable as well as the bills payable.

When the matter of a graduated scale of water rates was discussed President Harry E. Wing appointed Trustees Scribner, Peterson and McKillip as a committee to investigate the matter and report at a later board meeting. This plan of graduated rates has been under discussion for some time and the board felt that in fairness to all a thorough investigation of the matter should be made before any action was taken.

Vesper services, annual membership luncheon, leadership council meeting, March board meeting, poster committee, civic orchestra practice and tea, Red Cross classes, Miss Daley's tap dancing class and Miss Seymour's modern dancing class with their visitors created and attendance of 1816. Outside organizations using the building included the League of Women Voters and a Girl Scout meeting, bringing that total to 160. Eighteen transients in the house and 12 permanent guests were among those who created 465 as the daily record for use of the building.
