Mrs. Theodore Osborn, who has just been re-elected president of the Highland Park Young Women's Christian association, will represent the membership as voting delegate to the National Convention in Colorado Springs, April 29 to May 5. Mrs. Alfred Burdick, third vice-president, will be the alternate delegate from the board. Mrs. Einar Paulsen, president of the Mother's club, Mrs. Harry V. Renner past president of the Mother's club, and Miss Estelle Buser, representing the Friendship club composed of household employees, complete the official delegates whose credentials have been sent this week to national headquarters by Mrs. Corliss Anderson, convention chairman for the local association.

"Probably no other city the size of Highland Park will have as many as five delegates go as many miles to the national meeting," says Mrs. Anderson. "We want to thank everyone whose cooperation has made this splendid showing possible. The ideas which will be brought back to our home association will help in building a more helpful program in our community."

Mrs. Luis Schemmel and Mrs. Cora St. John were representatives sent by the Mother's club to the last national convention in Minneapolis. This is the first time delegates have gone from the association as a whole, due to club members now being part of the larger fellowship of the Y. W. C. A. since the new purpose has been adopted. Highland Park's five delegates will attend sessions on youth problems today with 1500 delegates from city, suburban and rural associations. Unemployment, world peace, health and education classes, the contribution of religion to youth's problems, how to better social and economic conditions, are among discussion topics.

Adult Education Teachers Meet In 2 Day Convention

Various Speakers Discuss Aspects of Adult Education Program

Monday and Tuesday were two interesting and instructive days at the convention of Adult Education teachers in Lake County. The convention was held at YWCA building in Waukegan and was under the supervision of Mr. Lacy, superintendent of Adult Education, and E. P. Huntley, district project technician.

The meeting opened on Monday morning with Joseph L. Thoman, chief state consultant, giving the introductory remarks, who spoke on the opportunities for education in different countries, the new demand upon education to meet the changing conditions, its broadening and cultural effect upon the individual, as well as democracy under the control of educated people, with a spirit of understanding, tolerance and sympathy.

Gordon A. Cook, state consultant for literacy, spoke on "Classroom Procedure in Elementary Teaching for Adults," and in his talk spoke of the need for sympathy and understanding of each individual to make a success of his work.

Mrs. Mildred Weaver, teacher of citizenship classes in Lake Forest, spoke of her classes there, and her experience in teaching these pupils. The forenoon session closed with an informal discussion which proved to be very instructive.

"The Place of Music on a Citizenship Program," was presented by Mrs. Margaret Russo, teacher in Highland Park, and the discussion opened up many possibilities along this line.

Mr. Aillaud, teacher of French and Spanish classes at Highland Park also connected with the adult education program, gave a demonstration class in French, showing the direct method of teaching by dramatization of the subject material, which was greatly appreciated.

The Tuesday afternoon session opened with a patriotic address by Will Penn Wilkerson, Cherokee Indian, speaking on the Constitution. His timely, inspiring and instructive discourse aroused a just feeling of pride and admiration for our country and constitution.

The convention closed with a discussion by Mrs. Bailson, "Texts and Teachers' Helps in Citizenship Work." She has given considerable thought and thought to the ways and means of making effective the work in citizenship. Instructions were given as to how aliens may be assisted in making out applications for "papers," and how to extend a sympathetic helping hand to prospective citizens.

This was the first convention for teachers of adult education ever held in Lake County. It was a real success and everyone left enriched and better prepared to do their work more sympathetically, we are told. Credit is due Mrs. Dana Graham, local director for Lake County, who helped make the plans and preparations fruitful.

Lutheran Church To Celebrate Its 45th Anniversary

Double Commemoration To Be Held Sunday Morning, April 26

On January 1, 1891, the Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran church was organized and incorporated in due form, and on April 26 of the same year the present church building was dedicated. This double event will be commemorated on the coming Sunday as the 45th anniversary.

This congregation is a branch of the Glencoe Lutheran church, which was formerly situated on Green Bay rd. and the County line. The history of that church dates back to the year 1849, making it one of the pioneer churches in this community.

For some time the Lutherans of Highland Park belonging to the Glencoe church desired a place of worship here in the city, and so their pastor, the Rev. J. Adam Detzer, Jr., began conducting services in May 1888, first at McDaniels hall, the present site of the Highland Park State bank, and later at (Continued on Page 7)
