The rattlesnake found in our area is known as the Massasauga, and is the only poisonous snake found in northern Illinois. Feeding on frogs, it resembles in its habits, the copperhead and water moccasin. Whereas in the southwest, the larger rattlesnakes partake of warm blooded creatures. The Massasauga is a stout-bodied reptile, rarely found larger than three and one half feet in length. Those I have caught along the DesPlaines were all less than three feet in length.
