Bosworth and Miller To Head Respective County Parties

Dr. Robert R. Bosworth of Highland Park was unanimously elected to head the Lake County Democratic organization at that group's convention held in Waukegan this last Monday. He had been the leader in county campaign for the nomination of Gov. Horner and during the past year had acted as chairman of the county organizations during the illness of the late chairman, Frank McDermott.

Other officers selected were Einar Sorenson, Antioch, first vice-chairman; Walter Burke, Waukegan, second vice-chairman; Paul Brady of Shields, third vice-chairman; Anton Macrowski Jr., North Chicago, secretary; and Richard D. Stuck, Zion, treasurer.

The convention was called to order by Samuel Smith of Highland Park, the retiring secretary. Robert McCreary of Shields was named temporary chairman and Smith temporary secretary. The various harmony resolutions were introduced and approved. George Mayer of Waukegan also presented a resolution endorsing the death of the former chairman, Frank McDermott.

The county organization went on record endorsing the entire Democratic party ticket for the Nov. 3 election. The group also endorsed the candidacy of McCreary for the selection of delegates from the state-at-large for the national convention.

Delegates to the state convention to be held at Springfield on May 1 were to be named by the committee. Precinct committeemen are to signify their intentions of attending as delegates or alternates.

The Republican convention went off smoothly with the unanimous election of Ben Miller of Libertyville as chairman; John Spellman of Lake Forest, vice chairman; Elmer Clavey of Deerfield, treasurer; and William Marks of Lake Villa, secretary.

These four officers and 11 members approved by the committee as a whole will act as the executive committee of the central organization.

On a resolution from the floor Chairman Miller named vice-chairman Spellman, treasurer Clavey, secretary Marks, Homer Redding and M. E. Murrice to recommend 11 members.

This committee brought before the convention the names of Frank L. Davis of Benton, John Wirtz of Fremont, C. K. Anderson of Antioch, William Witten and John Oliver of Deerfield, Edwin Burgess and Harold J. Talbot of Shields, and Frank Foglayen, Garfield Leaf, Paul Kaiser, and Frank P. Worack of Waukegan.

Kut Kiesow of Waukegan submitted the name for Herman C. Litchfield for the executive committee. The convention accepted the committee's recommendation, except for the four members from Waukegan. The Waukegan committeemen went into a caucus and Litchfield withdrew his name. The caucus reported that it was satisfied with the special committee's recommendation and the four Waukegan members recommended were elected.

During the discussion on the selection of the executive committee, Secretary Marks reported that the Republican party was stronger at this time than at any other time in the history of the county. The county organization at present, he said, has \$3,000 on hand to finance the coming election campaign.

Brothers To Meet in Golf Matches at the Bon-Air

Brothers, headed by the golfing professionals, Tom and "Buck" Kelly, will hold the fairway spotlight Sunday at Bon-Air Golf and Country club, the former Columbian course, 1 mile north of Wheeling on Milwaukee avenue, on Sunday, May 2, in the first of a series of outstanding golf events open to the public.

Annually the Kelly boys—Tom of the Sunset Valley course in Highland Park, and "Buck" the professional at the Bon-Air daily fee layout—stage a battle for family golf supremacy. This year their test will have some side frills in that various brother combinations from the North Shore district will also compete.

Bon-Air has recruited Alex and Mac Wolak of Highland Park and another star Highland Park pair of brothers "Hap" and Dick Martin, the latter a former Big Ten title holder. This team of brothers will represent Bon-Air Sunday while Tom has enlisted another quartet of brothers to represent Sunset Valley. Bill Chambers and his brother, Paul, and the Olsens, Art and Paul, will carry on for Sunset Valley. The Chambers will be matched against the Wolaks, while the Olsens will battle the Martins. Meantime, of course, the Kelly family will carry on its own private feud.

An invitation to all golf fans to attend Sunday's match—play will start at 2:30 o'clock—is extended by Tom Williams, manager of the Bon-Air club. Admission to the grounds and parking space is free.
