Of the soloists, ratings in the first division, were won by John Engstrom, Neuton Hoffman, and Jim Sanford, with John and Neuton recommended for the national, to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, on May 14. "I am very pleased and satisfied with the results of the state contest," Mr. Finch, director, said. "Our band being placed in first division speaks well for our school—one of the smallest in the Class 'A' competitions."

Eight East Aurora, and Morton high school bands will represent the class 'A' Illinois bands at the National contest in Cleveland, Ohio, this year.
