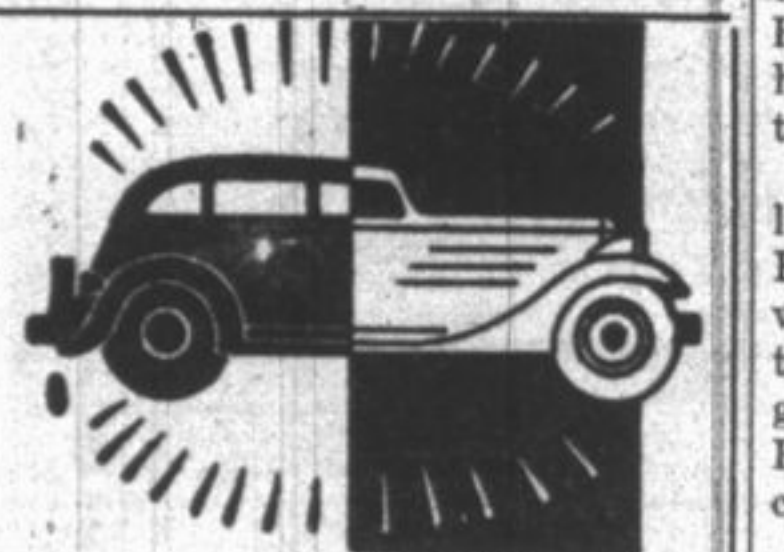
Mr. George Pettis celebrated his 74th anniversary on Tuesday, April 28th.
