Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Righteousness keepeth him that is upright in the way; but wickedness overthroweth the sinner. . . Good understanding giveth favour; but the way of transgressors is hard" (Prov. 13:6, 15).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science Textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Fear of punishment never made man truly honest. . . Reason is the most active human faculty. Let that inform the sentiments and awaken the man's dormant sense of moral obligation, and by degrees he will learn the nothingness of the pleasures of human sense and the grandeur and bliss of a spiritual sense, which silences the material or corporeal. Then he not only will be saved, but is saved" (p. 327-328).

Dovenmuehle To Open New Offices May 1

On Friday, May 1, Dovenmuehle, Inc., the eighty year old mortgage banking firm will open its new offices which occupy the major portion of the bank floor of the Westminster building, at the southwest corner of Dearborn and Monroe in Chicago.

This space, which is about forty percent larger than the offices which the Dovenmuehle firm has heretofore occupied, has been leased for a period of five years.

Plans have been drawn to develop this space into an ideal mortgage office, laid out to give maximum light and air, and at the same time be free of the noise and dust that are so prevalent in downtown offices.

"In making this move," said T. A. Buehner, president of the firm, "Dovenmuehle, Inc. is returning to the corner where it had previously engaged in the mortgage business for a quarter century. It was in 1904 that the company leased offices on the top floor of the old Guardian Bank building, which has since been razed."

"During the recent depression, while many mortgage houses were going out of business, Dovenmuehle, Inc., continued to grow. In addition to carrying on its work as loan correspondent and servicing the properties of its insurance clients; the company also co-operated actively with the various governmental agencies which were being set up in an effort to unfreeze the mortgage market and start a new flow of real estate credit. It was the first private mortgage banking house in Illinois to be approved by the F.H.A. and one of the first to make loans in co-operation with the R.F.C."

"The present indications are that 1936 will be the biggest year in the firm's history," concluded Mr. Buehner, "and this has necessitated our moving to larger quarters. In looking about for a new location, we were influenced by the fact that Dovenmuehle, Inc., has been located on Dearborn street continuously since the beginning of the century."
