The Cowbird, a summer resident in our region, builds no nest.

The cowbird has no standing in the bird world. It is a true villain and no self-respecting American bird wants to be found in his company. English sparrows do not seem to be aware of the customs of the New World birds and so associate with them.

The cowbird's contribution to the springtime chorus is nothing more than a guttural bubbling given with apparent nautical effort. These birds are about seven inches in length and have no conspicuous coloration. The head, neck and breast are a dull seal brown, the rest of the plumage is bluish black, with purplish reflections.

They visit both woodland and pastures and are often in company with cattle. Often they are seen about the feet of the animals presumably feeding on the insects found there.

The female builds no nest of her own but places her eggs in another bird's nest, generally selecting the nest of a bird smaller than herself. I have often watched one of these birds speaking through the woods in search of a victim upon whom she can shift her duties of motherhood. To cover the eggs and to avoid starting an avian eleemosynary institution, the true owner will build a second story on the nest. Yellow warblers will often do this, I have often seen nests two or three stories high. Usually two eggs are left to be incubated by the foster parents, but I have found four cowbird eggs in a nest of a Towhee. This is another species often preyed upon.

The offsprings are born with true cowbird character. They demand ownership of the nest, get the greater share of the food and starve out the rightful owners of the nest. Long after they should care for themselves they demand the attention of their foster parents. When they are almost matured and nothing more is to be gained in the nest they will leave. The next action is to join the flocks of their kind in pastures and grain fields.

Cowbirds are common residents in our region, they are beneficial to man as insect eaters but apparently nothing can be done to change the queer nesting habit they have.
