Hecketsweiler Studio Observes 18th Year in Business Here

The Hecketsweiler Studio, located at 7 South St. Johns avenue, is this week celebrating the 18th year of its founding in Highland Park by Jacob Hecketsweiler, who has been in the photography business for over 35 years.

A recent item in the "From our Files" column of the Libertyville Independent Register, dated May 1, 1901, stated that "Jake Hecketsweiler has gone to Morton Grove to learn the photography business."

Mr. Hecketsweiler opened his first photographic studio 18 years ago on Elm Place in the building now occupied by the Highland Bump Shop, and a short time later moved to Second Street, where he was in business until April, 1935, when he removed into his present modern quarters.

The early equipment was almost entirely hand made, and all photo finishing was done by hand. As the years went by, however, new and improved equipment was added at regular intervals, until at present the studio is prepared to do work of the most exacting nature with excellent results.

One branch of photography for which the firm is especially noted among its patrons, is the production of unusually fine work on children's pictures. The art of gaining a child's confidence so that natural expression may be registered in the finished photo, rather than, as often happens, a timid expression, and stilted posture is one in which the studio takes justifiable pride.
