

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH OBSERVES 60TH YEAR

Commemorative Service To Be Held Sunday; Special Program Planned

A celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of St. Paul's Evangelical church, Deerfield and the dedication of the newly remodeled church building will be held Sunday, May 17, with three special services planned by the pastor, Reverend F. G. Piepenbrok.

These festivities had been scheduled for an earlier date, but the severe winter caused a postponement. It is expected that thirty new members will be received into the church on Sunday morning. Membership at the fiftieth anniversary was only 75 and at present it is 285 (not including those to become members Sunday).

Brief History

St. Paul's church was called into existence in 1875, established by twenty-three families. The land for the church was donated by William Osterman, Sr., and in November of 1875, the church was completed for dedication. The congregation is still worshipping in the church its forefathers erected. During the sixty years improvements have been made—a Sunday School room added, a new basement for social activities, colorful memorial windows, new heating plant, gas, electricity and water, a memorial front entrance have made the edifice more modern, but the exterior structure remains the same.

The church and grounds have always been well cared for and the white church with its tall spire, will remain as a landmark for many generations to come.

Poppy Day will be observed in Highland Park on Saturday, May 23. Mrs. Robert Greenslade is acting as chairman for the Auxiliary of Dumaresq Spencer post No. 145 of the American Legion. Poppies will be sold by members of the Auxiliary, and it is hoped that Highland Park residents will purchase their poppies from the local group, instead of buying elsewhere.

Nearly everyone knows the story of the poppy for each Saturday before Memorial Day, millions of Americans wear the little flower in memory of the men who lost their lives in the World War. The Poppy became the nation's memorial flower because during the World War, these flowers sprang up on the battle fields and in the trenches and about the shell holes, as well as on the hastily made battle graves where comrades were left to rot in the sun. It seemed as if the gallant spirit of the dead had passed into the blood red blossoms and that through the little flowers they were sending a message of courage and hope to those who still lived.

All poppies sold in Illinois by the Legion Auxiliary are made by disabled ex-service men in hospitals for which they are paid one half cent each.
