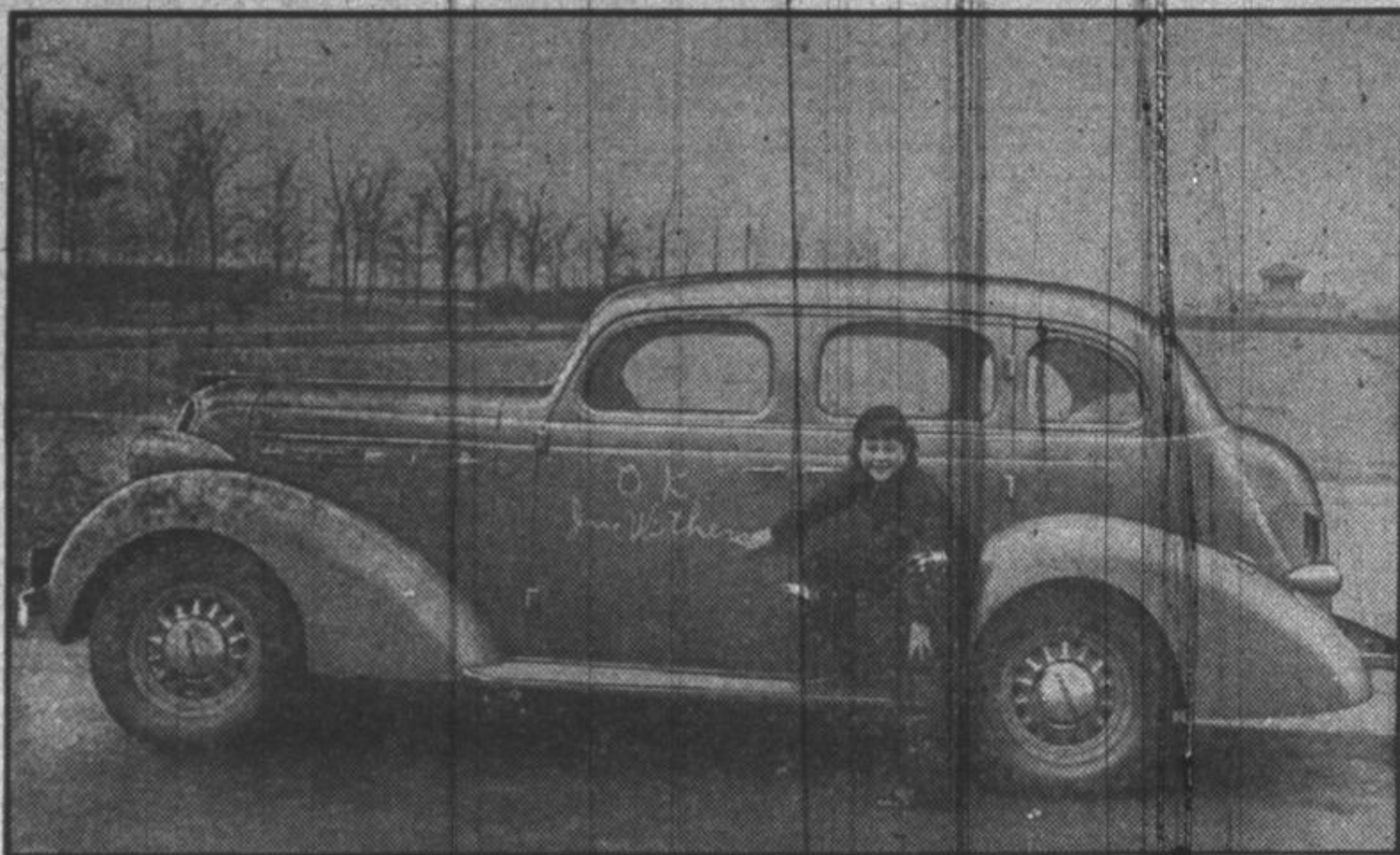


### IT'S A NEW GAG AND JANE THOUGHT OF IT

### Illinois Doctors To Meet in 86th Annual Conference

The 86th annual meeting of the Illinois State Medical Society will officially open at the Knights of Columbus building, Springfield, at 10 p.m., Tuesday, May 19, with Dr. Charles B. Reed, of Chicago, president, presiding.

Every moment until noon this Thursday will be occupied with scientific programs bringing the new in medicine to doctors of the state, business meetings, social events and conferences.

Scientific exhibits presented by medical schools, hospitals and individuals will be extensive and very popular with those attending the meeting. Commercial exhibits will demonstrate the latest physical therapy products, foods, drugs and medical publications.

The Woman's Auxiliary will also hold its annual meeting with the president, Mrs. W. D. Chapman of

Silvis, presiding. Many social events have been planned for the ladies, including bridge and golf tournaments.

The Abraham Lincoln Hotel of Springfield will be the headquarters and the scientific sessions and all exhibits will be held at the Knights of Columbus building.

### Libertyville Plans Centennial Celebration

A five-day celebration crammed with entertainment for the whole countryside is planned for July 1-5 by residents of Libertyville in observance of the hundredth anniversary of the town's founding.

A huge pageant, an amusement carnival, outdoor dancing every evening, two big political programs, and a county-wide community picnic on the fourth of July are among the events in the program as outlined at present.

The pageant, which will trace the history of the community from the days of the Indians to the present time, has been written by Jack Morrow of Libertyville, writer and lecturer. It will be enacted in an outdoor stadium each evening by a cast of three to four hundred people under the direction of Howard Tooley of Chicago, a member of the International Locomotive Association.

ership, Libertyville citizens expect to offer a dramatization of local history which will be an attraction of first magnitude.

Another outstanding feature of the celebration will be two county-wide political rallies, in which the Republican party will gather under the banner of the "Abraham Lincoln Wide Awakes" of 1860, while the Democrats will rally to the cry of the "Stephen Douglas Invincibles," as they did in the early days of this community.

Children's parades and games will feature the big, old-fashioned 4th of July picnic which is scheduled for the morning of that day. The picnic itself will be modeled closely on the one held one hundred years ago when the community changed its name from Varden's Grove to Libertyville.

An impressive opening parade, an amateur boxing exhibition, and a great variety of exhibits and concessions for the entertainment of visitors are also included in plans for this large scale "hundredth birthday party," as announced by the Libertyville Centennial committee.

### THE PRINTING PRESS AND PROSPERITY

Since its first beginnings the Printing Press has been recognized as a prosperity-builder, as well as a contributor to human happiness and understanding.

It has aided our national well-being in many ways. By spreading knowledge of new ideas and new products, by telling the producer how his goods may be improved and the consumer where they may be obtained, it has brought about that wide interchange of ideas and products which is the basis of all progress and prosperity.

For the worker it has boosted the purchasing power of wages by lowering the cost of what he buys. For the seller it has increased profits, even at reduced prices, by greatly expanding his market.

Those are the wealth-creating powers of the Printing Press—when it engages in its normal functions.

But there are theorists who advocate use of the Printing Press as a prosperity-builder in quite a different way. They want to use it to create money, instead of wealth.

They seek to encourage the belief that if the presses at Washington simply print a lot more dollar bills, without additional reserves to sustain their value, everybody can get rich. They ignore the teachings of experience—that reckless currency inflation boosts all prices, and thereby lowers the purchasing value in every pay envelope.

The two uses should not be confused. Behind the output of the press which prints our newspapers, our books, our magazines and our advertisements is all the productive strength of the country. History has proved this.

Behind the output of the press which prints recklessly inflated currency is a misleading theory—

which breeds bitter disappointment. History has proved, that, too.
