



Ideal Weather for Scout Training

The Elements of Scoutmastership Training Course which has been postponed for two weeks because of inclement weather was held at the Cabin-in-the-Woods last Saturday under ideal weather conditions. These men received advanced certificates as instructors. Besides the above the following acted as additional faculty: Paul Muzik, Jack Davis, George Scheuchenpflug, C. G. Speer, George Ryan and George Barch. Dave Henderson was the chef and was assisted by Scouts Bob Piper and Oliver Burns. The second half of the course will be conducted next fall.

Council Received West Congratulations

In a letter received this week from the Chief Scout Executive, James E. West, the North Shore Area Council was congratulated upon having earned the 1935 Ten Year Program Award. The award was made for achieving certain goals in the Ten Year Program of the Boy Scouts of America. These achievements included high records in New Scouts, total membership, and keeping boys in Scouting for long periods of time. It was necessary for a majority of the Troops in the Council to earn the Troop Award before the Council was eligible. Following is the letter received from Dr. West:

"I am informed that the North Shore Area Council has qualified for the 1935 Ten Year Program Award. I take pleasure in congratulating you and your co-workers.

"The contribution of your Council with that of others is largely responsible for what progress Scouting has made during the past three years.

"I trust that you will be able to maintain your pace and achieve all the goals in new citizens which you have set for the Ten Year Program to be achieved finally in 1942."

Second Period at MaKa-Ja-Wan Full

The second period at Camp MaKa-Ja-Wan is full and all places are reserved. The capacity of the camp is 160 Scouts and that number was reached this week, thereby making it necessary to turn down applications for that particular period. The first period was almost full on Monday of this week when this was written, there being 129 reservations in. The third period is filling up now and Scouts who wish to go to MaKa-Ja-Wan are urged to sign up for the third period, the dates of which are July 24 to August 6. There are now twice as many Scouts registered for third period as there were when camp opened last summer, so even third period reservations must be made soon if Scouts are to be sure of a place being left. First come, first served.

Girl Scouts Open Summer Camp

June 15 will be the opening day of Girl Scout camping at Skokie House, it was announced by the Highland Park Girl Scout Council. Overnight camping by the week for all Girl Scouts who have completed eighth grade will be from June 25 to July 23. There will be day camping for registered Girl Scouts of all ages, from June 22 to July 23, with transportation provided.

Skokie House, which is located at Dundee and Waukegan roads, provides an ideal place for every type of camp experience, with a garden and grounds for all Scout activities, and the whole Forest Preserve for hiking. The camp is under the direction of Miss Kelly, an experienced camp leader, who will have an able corps of assistants. Scouts should register as soon as possible, as the number is limited.

Camp life farther from home may be had at Camp Hickory Hill, the Girl Scout camp near Edgerton, Wisconsin, and at Pottawatomie Hills, near Elkhorn, Elkhorn, Wisconsin. Timber Trail, near Munising, Michigan is for second class Girl Scouts over 14 years of age who have had previous camp experience. A gypsy trip is also be-

ing organized for Girl Scouts over 12 years old with camping experience, who will go by bus to Cleveland, Niagara Falls, Adirondack Mountains, Thousand Islands and Montreal. Information about camp registration may be had from Mrs. Robert Clark, camp chairman for Highland Park.
