"Mortals and Immortals" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 17.

The Golden Text was, "What man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God" (1 Cor. 2:11).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "As for man, his days are as grass; as a flower of the field, so he flourisheth. For the wind passeth over it and it is gone; and the place thereof shall know it no more. But the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children: To such as keep his covenant, and to those that remember his commandments to do them" (Psalms 103:15-18).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science Textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Human birth, growth, maturity, and decay are as the grass springing from the soil, with beautiful green blades, afterwards to wither and return to its native nothingness. This mortal seeming is temporal; it never merges into immortality, but finally disappears, and immortal man, spiritual and eternal, is found to be the real man" (p. 190).

Riverview Speedway
Opens Sunday Night

Midwest automobile racing will be elevated to a new high plane with the dedication (next Sunday night (May 24) of the Riverview Speedway located on Addison st. just west of Western ave. The fifth of a mile track has been leased by the Midwest Auto Racing association of which Thorne Donnelly is president, for contests to be conducted on Wednesday and Sunday nights under the auspices of the Midwest association.

"We have adopted the most approved features of the abbreviated tracks on the Pacific Coast where the sport is now in its fourth year and have laid out a stretch that is acknowledged by experts to be the fastest in the world," said Mr. Donnelly. "It has been scientifically treated and designed to yield faster time under favorable conditions than any track ever built for the acres of the midwest racing cars."

Illuminating engineers have provided special lighting facilities and a grandstand with every seat commanding a perfect view of the course has been erected. Acres of parking area are available, it is announced.
