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Deerfield Legion Memorial Day Plans

The community of Deerfield is invited to assemble at the Deerfield Grammar school on Saturday, May 30, at 10 a.m. for the annual Memorial Day services of the American Legion.

A short program has been planned for the assembly at the school by Commander Marshall Pottenger. There will be community singing of America and the bugle will play the colors, followed by the invocation of the chaplain.

Henry Foval, of Lake Bluff, past commander of the Eighth District will deliver the address.

The annual presentation of a new flag to the grade school will be made by the Junior Auxiliary of which Elaine Plagge is president.

Two medals will be awarded by the Auxiliary unit to winners of the Poppy Poster contest to Thurston Hurst of the Deerfield school and Betty Hagbloom of the Wilmot school.

From Fort Sheridan will come the officer of the day, a bugler and six soldiers to take part in the ceremony. The officer will have charge of the parade and before the marching begins each child will be provided with a flag.

A tentative plan of the lineup: colors; Civil War veterans; Spanish American veterans; Gold Star mothers; American Legion; American Legion Auxiliary; Daughters of the American Revolution; Junior Auxiliary; Boy Scouts; Girl Scouts; Deerfield school; Wilmot school.

The procession will march to the Deerfield cemetery. The decorating of the graves will take place at the Deerfield cemetery followed by a short talk by Henry Foval, and a prayer by the chaplain, closing with taps.

Townsend Meeting Is Planned for Highwood

Dr. Truman H. Gordon national speaker for the Townsend Old Age Pension will make an address on the Townsend plan in Highwood in the very near future, taking as his subject "Will the Townsend Plan Bring Prosperity?"

Dr. Gordon will explain the working and intentions of the Townsend plan, which, according to him, has for its purpose the circulation of money over a wider scope, old age annuities, and employment insurance, will also go into detail in regard to the present Washington investigation.

The Townsend plan and organization, according to its exponents, is non-sectarian — and non-partisan, and has for its purpose the primary object of providing for the indigent aged, as well as cause the circulation of money over a much wider area.

The time and place of the meeting will be announced later in The Press, and will be held either at the city hall, Highwood or the city park in the same town depending on the weather.

Dr. Gordon also states that he will at the conclusion of his address, be glad to answer any and all questions, pertaining to this subject.
