Breezes from the Open

Antigo, Wis., May 25—The fishermen visiting this north central section of Wisconsin have certainly made some fine catches this past week. There has been plenty of rain and a prevailing strong wind but that did not keep the walleyes from the minnow hooks.

Saturday everyone on Pickerel lake made a good catch. Pickerel, is about 15 miles south of Crandon and 25 miles north of Antigo. This and other nearby lakes are conveniently located and are very popular in this region. Some of the smaller, but good spots, are on Crain lake adjoining Pickerel and Rolling Stone lake west of Pickerel.

Rolling Stone lake is a perfect place for getting back in the heavy timber, away from the motor boat menace of being disturbed and gives one a quiet and restful time. Wall-eye lodge, owned and operated by L. Heimerl, is one of the best kept resorts one can wish to find in this region. Heimerl boasts his fish as being horn-fed and a catch of nine nice walleye pike (pike perch) certainly showed he has the right name for these fighters.

Perch are becoming more numerous in all these lakes and pan fish can be taken from these waters in good numbers. Trout fishing is at

hand here also, as this chain of lakes is only a few minutes drive from the upper Wolf river.

It is true that spots in certain lakes prove to be better for an angler and not so bountiful for others. One of these favorite spots is in the channel between Pickerel and Crain lakes. They have always had good luck at this spot during the spring, but this year it has proven more popular than in the past. Minnows are used for bait rather than plugs and fishing near the surface has given everyone good sport. I saw at least twenty pike taken in the channel in two hours, by ten men, the good feature is they were all fair sized. One catch for the afternoon included three walleyed pike totaling 24 pounds. That certainly was not to be sneezed at.

Later in the season this spot is not so good but I feel sure that your trip will be well spent if you desire to fish within three hundred and fifty miles of the North Shore.

I have heard reports of good fishing in Pelican lake again this spring. Pelican is popular as a muskie lake but a goodly number of other fish can be found there. Pelican is one of the largest lakes in north central Wisconsin, it is about 50 miles north of Antigo.

Col. Frank Knox To Be Speaker at Lake Forest College Commencement

Colonel Frank Knox, potential presidential candidate in the coming election, will speak at the 58th annual commencement exercises at Lake Forest college, on June 6. Colonel Knox is to speak on "The Philosophy of Plenty," the material for which is drawn from a broad life. Knox has been, primarily, a soldier and a newspaper man. His careers in both fields, however, are marked by steady progression.

Knox began his business activities by selling newspapers when he was a boy. Partly with these earnings, and partly with what he earned while in college, he managed to pay his way through Alma (Michigan) College, and graduated from that school in 1898. A few months after graduating, he enlisted in the army, and fought with the "Rough Riders" in Cuba.

After his return from the Spanish-American war, Knox became a reporter for the Grand Rapids herald. In 1901 he became publisher of the Sault St. Marie (Mich.) News, and a year later he bought half interest in the Lake Superior Journal. Ten years later he sold these interests and went to Manchester, New Hampshire, where he bought the Leader and the Union. When the United States entered the World war, Knox again offered his services, and eventually became a major in the 163d artillery brigade, 78th Division. He served overseas from May 26, 1918, to February 10, 1919.

In 1927, Colonel Knox planned to retire. It was then that William Randolph Hearst decided to try to take advantage of Knox' business ability. Hearst made him general manager of his entire organization, and Knox very substantially strengthened the financial structure of Hearst's newspapers. But by 1931, Knox and Hearst had disagreed on so many matters of policy that Knox quit.

Chicago then attracted him, and when he came west, General Charles G. Dawes and a group of prominent business men sponsored him in purchasing the Chicago Daily News. Colonel Knox is still publisher and editor of the Daily News, and has relieved the financial pressure that had come to bear upon it.

Throughout his business life, Colonel Knox has served in various political capacities. He has served on Committees of State under the governors of New Hampshire and Michigan, and has headed Republican convention delegations, as well as state and district party committees.

Household Hints

Stale cake can be made fresh by dipping it in milk for an instant, and then rebaking it slowly.

To avoid lowering its food value, do not brown the butter in making brown sauce or gravy. Toast or brown flour in the oven, making a quantity at a time for future use. Then simply melt butter and add browned flour. This improves the flavor.

Place ingredients for gravy in a wide mouthed salad dressing bottle; screw on top and shake well. You will have no lumps in your gravy.

Never turn boiled puddings out of the pan the moment they are

taken from the fire. They are very liable to break if this is done. Let them stand for a few minutes until some of the steam has evaporated and you will find that they will turn out easily.

Never starch linens; that are to be stored away for a long time. They are apt to crack. Rinse free from starch, dry and fold away, if possible, in blue paper. The blue paper prevents them turning yellow.

Try adding a little lemon juice to whipping cream. It will whip easier.

Soft butter or lard should never be used in making pie crust. What-ever shortening is used should be hard and very cold.

School Children Get Free Dental Inspection

Free dental examinations were given 461 children in 11 elementary schools in Lake county last month through the courtesy of the Lake County Dental Society co-operating with the Lake County Tuberculosis association.

Forty-one admitted to never brushing their teeth and promised to do better. Of the others, 181 brushed their teeth daily and 239 do it only occasionally.

The survey revealed that 72 children were found to have no cavities in their teeth. There were 644 cavities found in temporary teeth and 804 in permanent teeth. Schools receiving this service were Roseville, Gavin, Rondout, Ivanhoe, Oak Grove, Gurnee, Hawthorn, Channel Lake, North Prairie, Druce Lake and Grange Hall.
