## H. P. Post Office Will Distribute Bonus Bonds

### Veterans Must Obtain Bonds Personally and Must Be Identified

The Highland Park Post Office plans window delivery of the Veteran's Adjusted Service Bonds from six to ten p.m. the evening of Monday, June 15. To receive their bonds, veterans must be known to one of the clerks, or be identified by officers of the American Legion, who will be present, or by persons they may bring with them who are known to the post office employees on duty. Discharge papers are not sufficient.

The following day, June 16, regular delivery of the bonds remaining will be made by carrier to the veterans' addresses. Receipt for the bonds must be given by the veteran himself, who must be known to the carrier, or be identified by some member of his family, or by some neighbor known to the carrier. Veterans may, in advance, notify their carrier of some other day (before July 15) when they will be at their address in person to receive the bonds. Or again, after June 16, bonds may be called for at post office, with proper identification. Bonds will be kept at the post office until July 15, except in the case of deceased veterans or those who are known to have left Highland Park. Bonds will not be forwarded but returned to Department, with new out-of-town address.

As to payment, in cash, of the Adjusted Service Bonds, starting Tuesday morning, June 16, veterans who have received their bonds may present them in person at the post office for certification for payment. Similar identification as in the case of delivery of the bonds is again required. The bonds so presented are the same day sent into Chicago by the post office, at the expense of the government, a receipt for the bonds being issued the veteran. In the course of a few days, the veterans will receive by ordinary mail, personal delivery and identification not required, a government check, made out to him, for the amount of the bonds sent in. The bonds being in denomination of \$50 each, one or more may be presented for payment, now or any time up to 1945, when they mature and are all payable. They are registered bonds bearing 3% interest.

Estimated figures, based on the known number of veterans residing in Highland Park, and based on each veteran receiving an average of \$500, indicate that approximately \$243,000 in Adjusted Service Bonds will be distributed to some 486 local veterans.

Postmaster General James A. Farley has announced: "It will be my privilege on June 13, from 7 to 7:15 p.m., EST, over a nation-wide radio broadcast (Blue Network National Broadcasting company), to bring to the men and women who participated in the World War a special message explaining the final preparations for the delivery and payment of the Adjusted Service Bonds."

## FLAG DAY, 1936

"The work that we do is the making of the flag." America, as this is written, is preparing for its annual and reverent celebration of Flag Day.

From every public building, from millions of private homes, will fly the standard which has been the symbol of American valor and of American love of freedom through a century and a half of glorious history.

What is America doing today to perpetuate those qualities, woven into the flag by the strength and the courage of our fathers?

Are our politicians preaching valour when they urge the sons of pioneers to deny their own initiative, their own self-reliance, and to turn instead to a centralized government for direction, for ideas and for support?

Are the new economic prophets preaching love of freedom when they ask our people to relinquish their constitutional right to govern themselves, so it may be delivered into the hands of temporary officeholders and bureaucrats?

The men and women who braved both danger and hardship to carry the flag across a continent wouldn't have thought so. Few Americans who love personal liberty and independence would think so today. If they did, our flag would lose its meaning.

Franklin K. Lane once personified the American Flag as speaking thus to an humble worker:

"I am your belief in yourself, your dream of what a people may become."

"I am all that you hope to be, and have the courage to try for."

"I am the Constitution and the Courts, statutes and the statute-makers, soldier and draftsman, counselor and clerk."

"I am the clutch of an idea, and the reasoned purpose of resolution."

"I am what you make me, nothing more."

We know what our fathers made the Flag. Can we afford to nullify their labors?

## N. S. Trust Co. to Pay 10% Dividend to Its Depositors

Payment of another dividend, this time one of 10 per cent, and amounting to \$43,458.60, to creditors and depositors of the North Shore Trust bank, which closed in 1932, was approved Monday of this week in an order issued by Judge Ralph J. Dady.

The dividend, which was declared by State Auditor Edward J. Barrett is the fourth since the closing of the institution. The other three were in the amounts of 10 per cent, 33 per cent, and 25 per cent, respectively.

The petition showing that the state auditor had declared the dividend payment was presented in Circuit court Monday by Attorney E. S. Gail, of Highland Park, counsel for Receiver William L. O'Connell of the bank. S. P. Johnston is deputy receiver in charge of the liquidation of the assets of the bank.
