### A NEEDED SAFETY MEASURE

Rigorously enforced speed laws are a prime measure in decreasing accidents. Education of adults and children in the fundamentals of safety are also needed and commendable. Both of these, however, take time to bear fruit.

There is ONE safety measure which could be applied immediately, with immediately noticeable results. This measure is the elimination of natural hazards, conditions which tend to make accidents harder to avoid for the careful as well as the reckless or drunken driver.

One of the most vicious and accident producing hazards in Highland Park, is the obstruction of the view at intersections by tall, thick growths of bushes. Beautiful, yes, but exacting a fearful toll for their beauty.

To the lovers of natural beauty who will now arise in wrath against any proposal to in any way disturb the natural charm of many of our beautiful streets, and who will point out that the exercising of a little care at intersections will eliminate any danger, it should be pointed out that although the exercising of this "little care" WOULD eliminate the danger, the care is NOT exercised.

Perhaps, some day, when the work of education has made us a nation of sane drivers, blind intersections will afford no hazards, but until that manifestation of the arrival of the measure of natural beauty, rather than lay upon its altar, the possibility of a child losing its life because someone thought that "no one would be coming from the other way."

Wisconsin will open Black Bass season June 20.

The black bass season, which rolls around June 20, remains to be celebrated by those fishermen expecting to visit Wisconsin in the latter part of June.

The bass have been spawning heavily this spring and reports are that a good season is to be looked forward to in all sections of our neighboring state. Those anglers who cannot have the privilege of getting farther up in the state can find some good bass waters near our north shore. Lake Geneva is perhaps the best known lake in southern Wisconsin for bass. However, there are certainly other places which will afford some good sport. Camp Lake, also in the Geneva region is known to many fishermen and is considered good fishing waters.

A few facts pertaining to these fish may be interesting. Female black bass carry 2,000 to 10,000 eggs at spawning time, they are a member of the sun fish family. The later fact is often one causing dispute among the natives of upper Wisconsin but the scientific Gethyologist will settle those arguments

for you with his classification.

Large mouthed black bass have common names in different localities which often confuse the amateur angler, some of these are often known as Tiger bass. I found that name often used by bass fishermen. The largest of the latter species on record, caught with tackle, weighed 14 pounds.

I know of no other fish that is quite as popular as a game fish for its size as the bass, no matter where one may find them. Using light tackle they will afford you plenty of sport as all-season fly rod users know.

Bass will take an assorted number of lures. The bumble bee fly is a favorite as is the Palomine lure, however, I won't get into the augmented subject of lures, you know those which have given you results and I do not wish to tread on my own toes by not mentioning your favorite.

With our hope running high I know the bass season will see an auspicious opening.

#### Chuck Wagon Supper

Following original outdoor supper these members wearing their bandana favors, were joined by others who came to attend the "Little Convention" when local delegates reviewed the entire program of the National Y meeting in Colorado Springs.

Mrs. Theodore Osborn gave a picture of the vastness of this meeting with 846 voting delegates representing 84,600 active members "back home", besides the hundreds of visiting delegates. Delegates from several foreign countries in their native costume were a reminder of the 52 countries where the blue triangle is found "to be alive spiritually to the problems of youth" was given as the convention theme.

The importance of the million and a half women in household employment working together through the Y.W.C.A. introduced the report of Miss Estelle Buser who represented the local Friendship Club. Special studies of employer-employee relations in raising the standard of the American home and training centers in several cities were described. "The Christian Way of Life as an Answer to the Acute Problems of Our Time" was the message that Mrs. Elmer Paulsen brought from the Business and Professional Girls' meeting which she attended, with a record of the national stand taken on legislative and public affairs problems concerning unemployment, child labor and international understanding. "Grow some of your own leadership" and "try to find the real interest of your community" were suggestions brought back from the national convention to the "Little Convention."
