

### "Y" Leadership Council Holds Last Meeting of Current Season

The last meeting of the Leadership Council of the Y.W.C.A., held on Monday, was filled with plans for study to prepare for fall activities. Each member chose a book of social, economic or religious significance from a list prepared by Miss Mary Egan, librarian, to study during the summer and review in the fall. A special committee was appointed to study three pamphlets dealing with religion applied to every day life as the basis for group thought next year. Plans were also made for a circulating library of Y.W.C.A. program helps of which Miss Gertrude Ames will be in charge. Miss Dorothy Simpson gave a special report on the need for a club of younger business girls and girls not yet employed and it was decided to proceed with plans for early fall organization with business girls as a directing committee. Girls who are home from college, high school graduates who are not yet employed, and the younger business girls of Highland Park, have been asking for their own club so every girl is invited to tell Miss Simpson and her organization committee just what they most want for programs or interest groups. Details of preliminary meetings will be announced after the vacation period.

In reviewing the worthwhile possibilities for such a new club Miss Simpson told of the many activities of Pi Delta, the club organized six years ago. These included tours to Chinatown and elsewhere, even twelve girls going to Washington, D. C., speakers, co-operating with other clubs in sending delegates to the Cause and Cure of War conference, attending "Y" summer camps and conferences in other cities, annual world fellowship banquets with Lake Forest and Waukegan club girls, Christmas parties with the Friendship and "B Y" club girls, philanthropic and social programs.

Mrs. Elbridge Pierce read a group of her poems which have a poignant spiritual thought as part of the devotionals for the meeting. Rosalis Fossbender is chairman of the Leadership Council and Ella McEuen, secretary.

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### Lake Forest Horse Show To Be Held June 25-28

Entries of six exhibitors from St. Louis yesterday brought the total value of horses entered in the 36th Lake Forest Horse show at Onwentsia, June 25, to 28, up to nearly \$1,000,000, assuring the show the greatest field of competitors in its history.

The St. Louis entries included the famous Augustus Busch and Jane Johnson strings of hunters and jumpers. Miss Johnson, whose entries represent the Trail's end stable made reservations for seven horses and the Busch string will include eight of the leading performers in the noted brewer's barns.

Paul Bakewell, III, also of St. Louis, has entered five jumpers and hunters and several other Missouri exhibitors will ship with the Bakewell string, giving St. Louis the largest representation of any out-of-town delegation.

Several eastern exhibitors and a number from Chicagoland will hold rehearsals in the Onwentsia ring this morning. A large part of the horses entered are already quartered at Onwentsia, preparing for the show in which \$6,000 in cash prizes will be distributed during the four days competition, in addition to ribbons and trophies.

Among those already on the scene are Turroy and Viaduct, two jumpers entered by Miss Eilee Bigelow of White Bear Lake, Minn., and Venice, the champion of the Floyd Rudocher stable at Wauwautosa, Wis.

Final check of the numbers of horses and entries in the 75 classes on Saturday is expected to set a new record for the Lake Forest show, which is held annually as a benefit for the Lake Forest Hospital association.

### Victory Work Shop To Hold Sale at The Moraine Hotel

The Victory Workshop, the only charitable organization in Chicago which enables deaf mutes to learn a trade and earn money while, doing so, will hold a sale of articles made by the students at the Moraine hotel, Highland Park, on June 19.

Founded by Mrs. Clarence Goldman, Highland Park, and sponsored and supported by a group of socially prominent and charitable-minded women, educators, and social workers from all parts of the city and suburbs, the Victory Workshop, located at 1472 S. Wabash, Chicago, is a training school for deaf and hard-of-hearing young people who have finished high school and are unable to find employment. It trains these young people to use their hands for their own support.

The articles made in the school are attractive, original, clever, and practical. Children's furniture, gaily painted—chairs, tables, waste-bas-

kets, bed-trays, costumes—all charmingly decorated with rosy-cheeked babies, soft cuddly guppies, or fluffy-furred kittens. They make aprons, luncheon sets, bibes, towels, sweaters, rugs—all beautiful, dainty, useable items.

The group of women backing the school raise funds for the Workshop to buy materials, they provide ideas for the articles made, furnish milk and transportation to the students, and devote time and energy to securing private homes, clubs, and hotels for the sales. They themselves are sales girls so that all the money may revert to the students.

Miss Elizabeth Welly Robertson, art director of the Chicago Public Schools Board of Education, will be official sponsor of the Victory Workshop sale at the Moraine. ### Roosevelt Recommends Two WPA Projects for Highland Park

The WPA projects for Highland Park were recommended by President Roosevelt in a bulletin received at the district office in Rockford. Both approved proposals contemplate improvements to parks and school grounds.

Sponsored by the park district, \$5,042 would be spent for grading, landscaping, improving tennis courts and similar work in Sunset, Lincoln and West Longview parks. Specifications also include plans for relaying five tees on the Sunset Valley golf course and for screening the beach sand on the Central avenue and Roger Williams beaches. Estimated cost for each improvement is: Sunset Park, \$1,750; West Longview, \$2,010; Lincoln, \$598; golf course, \$171; beach improvements, \$513.
