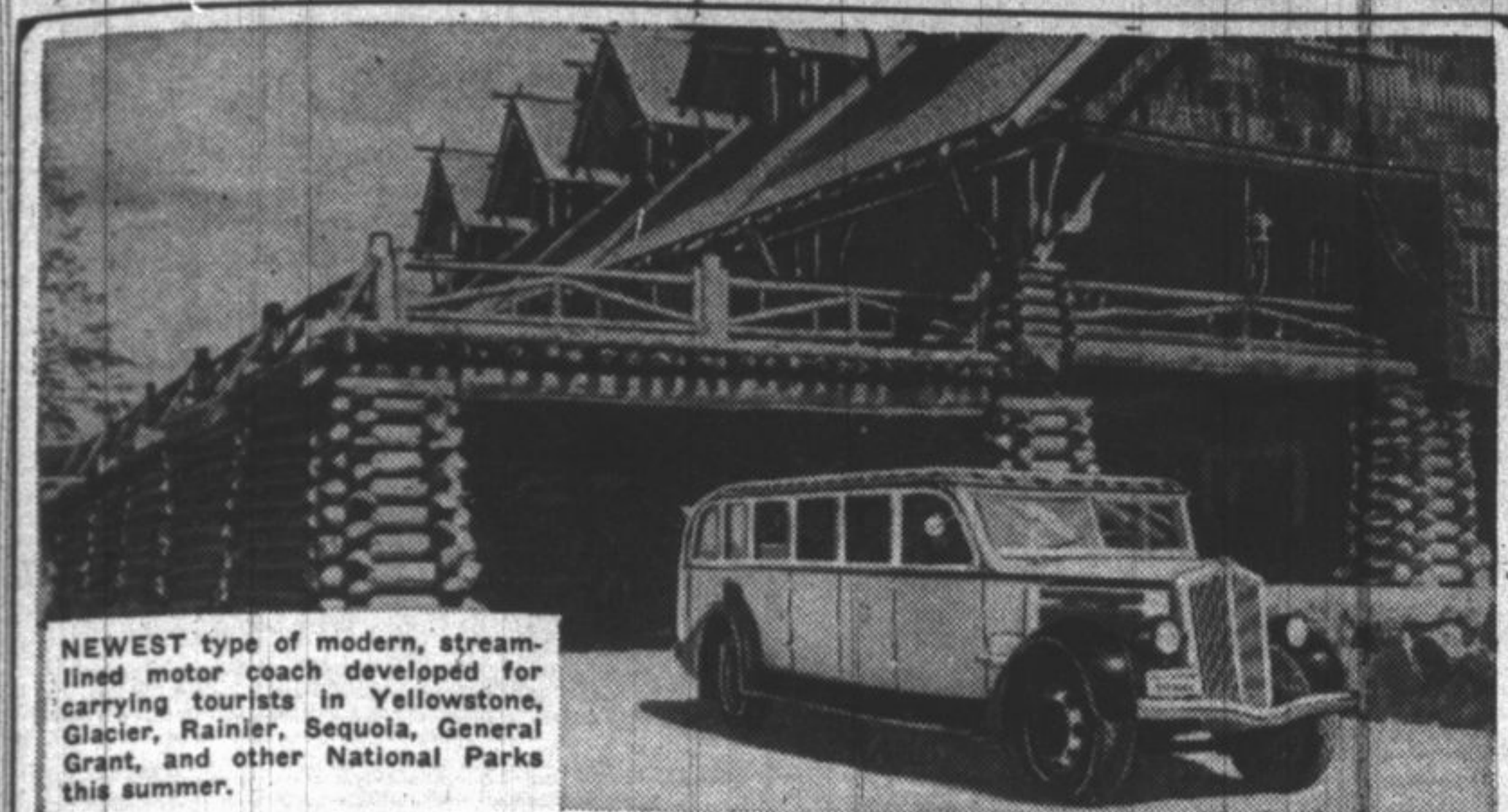
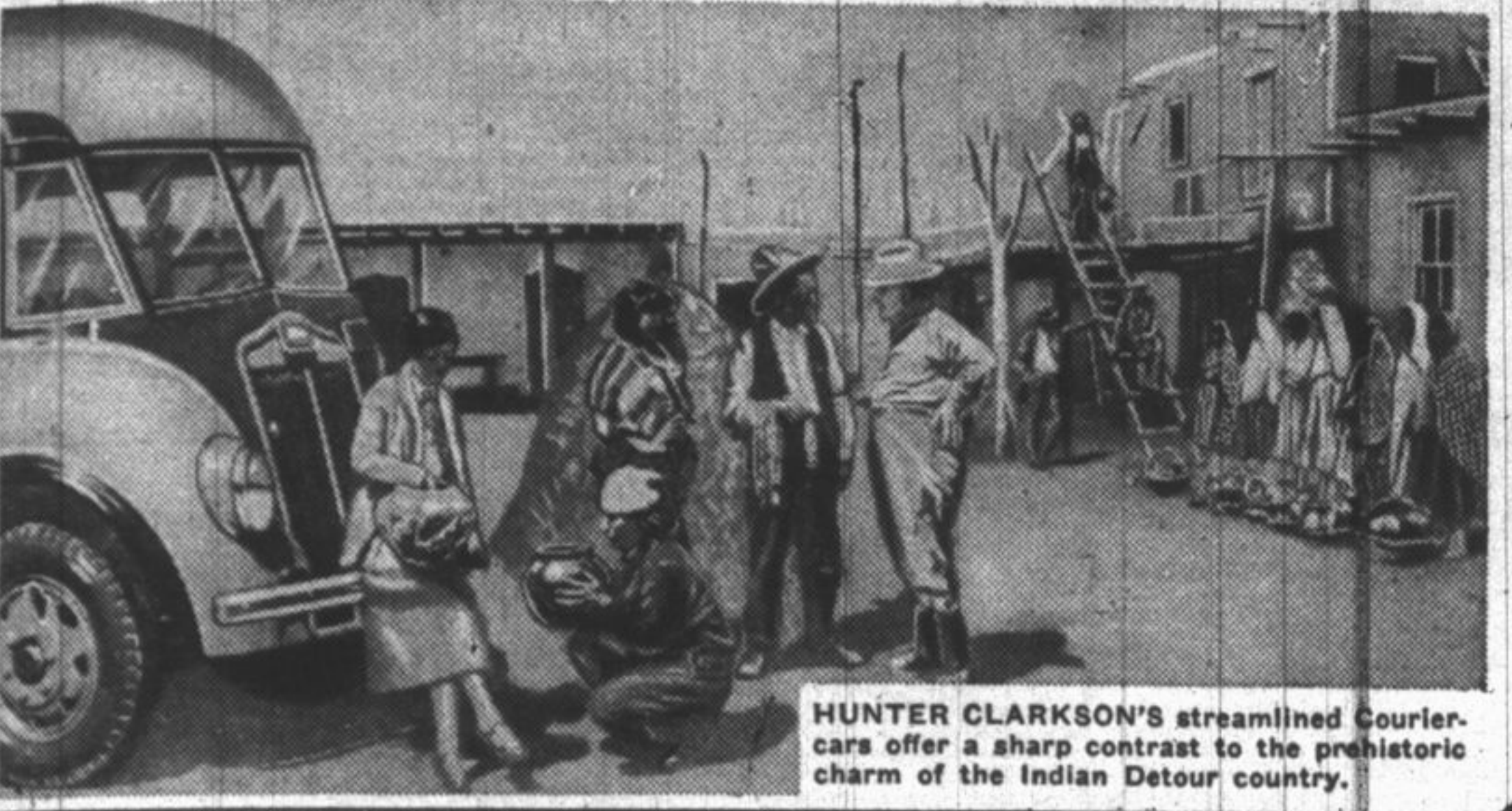


NATIONAL PARKS PREPARE FOR BIGGEST SEASON IN HISTORY

UNCLE SAM'S "Wonderlands of the West"—the National Parks, where millions of work-weary Americans get back to nature every year—are preparing for the greatest influx of tourists in their history this summer.

Yellowstone, Glacier, Rainier, Sequoia, General Grant, and other National Parks already have augmented their transportation fleets with 48 ultra-modern, streamlined White coaches, especially built for national park scenic service. They are the last word in safety and comfort and their streamline styling makes them the most beautiful sightseeing coaches in the world.

Stage Coaches Used Until 1917 It is a far cry from these luxurious vehicles, with every feature designed to promote the sightseer's relaxation of mind and body as he rolls through these natural fairylands, a far cry, indeed, from the primitive stage coaches which, as late as 1917, furnished transportation at Yellowstone. In that year, 175 White coaches replaced the horse drawn stages. Since then, these coaches have been the standard means of transportation not only at Yellowstone, Glacier, Rainier, Sequoia, and General Grant, but also at Rocky Mountain, Estes, Bryce Canyon, North Rim, Grand Canyon, Zion, Clarkson's Indian Detour and Crater.

Special "Roll Tops" The special streamlined coaches which will go into service at the beginning of the season at Yellowstone, Glacier, Rainier, Sequoia, and General Grant parks are equipped with unique "roll tops"—an ingenious means of providing the passengers with a full view of the parks' scenic grandeur. Special, full-width seats, the most luxurious type, have been installed.

Tourists visiting the parks never fail to marvel at the comfort of these White coach caravans and frequently comment on the contrast between this ultra-modern form of transportation and the aged scenic beauty of their surroundings. This contrast is particularly marked in the Indian Detour country around Santa Fe, New Mexico, where ultra-modern Couriers cars, operated by Hunter Clarkson, Inc., one of the country's best known transportation experts, thread their way through the prehistoric charm of such places as Santa Fe, Frijoles, Puyse and Taos. The sight of a streamlined White Couriercar drawn up in front of prehistoric cliff dwellings offers one of the sharpest contrasts between the oldest in America and the newest, between the quiet beauty of a past age and the quiet beauty of a modern product of the machine age.

Tasty Hamburger

2 lbs. hamburger
2 tablespoons flour
1½ teaspoons salt
¾ cup onion, sliced
Prepared mustard.

All salt and flour to meat. Mix thoroughly, divide into equal parts and shape into layer about one inch in thickness. Spread thickly with mustard and cover with onion rings. Top with second layer of meat. Bake in hot oven ¼ to ½ hour.

Cheese Puffs

To serve as luncheon accompaniment to salad or soup:

1 pkg. cream cheese
1 egg yolk
¾ teaspoon onion juice

Salt and pepper — (slight amount).
For five slices of white bread toast on one side and buttered slightly on untoasted side. Cut into quarters. Cream cheese, etc., to smooth paste, put teaspoonful on each square of toast—sprinkle with paprika. Place under low flame on broiler until golden brown, (watch closely) and firm to touch. Best served hot.
