Playgrounds Have Marked Increase in Enrollment

All Interested Are Urged To Enroll As Soon As Possible

The summer recreation program sponsored by the Park Board of Highland Park was started last week. To date a considerable increase in the enrollment over last year indicates that many more children as well as the adults of Highland Park are interested in the playground recreation program than in former years.

Children who have not as yet registered with the instructors on the playgrounds are asked to do so as soon as possible in order that they may receive full benefit of the summer program. Any boy or girl living in the community is welcome to the playgrounds, there being no charges or requirements in connection with the work. An interesting program has been prepared which will appear from week to week in the local newspapers giving in detail the schedule of activities for each day for all the playgrounds.

Among the features to be found in the program this summer is that of the story telling periods on Tuesday mornings. The Highland Park Public Library has kindly offered the services of Miss Rathbun of the library staff to take care of this work. Miss Rathbun, an experienced librarian, promises an interesting story telling hour every Tuesday morning for each playground.

All Dog Owners Must Have Pets Innoculated

Under the provisions of an ordinance passed by the city council and published in this week's issue of The Highland Park Press, all Highland Park dog owners are required to have their dogs innoculated for rabies before the necessary dog license can be issued.

In order to procure a dog license, it will be necessary to present a certificate of innoculation obtained from a duly licensed veterinarian. Anyone failing to comply with the provisions of the ordinance will be subject to a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25.

Chief of Police Ed Moroney estimates that of the approximately 11,500 dogs in Highland Park, 700 are already innoculated by owners who wish to run no risk of having their dogs contract rabies, a disease which has been especially prevalent on the North Shore this year.

Highland Park to Make Safety Traffic Survey

Work To Be Done by Harry G. Pertz and Chief of Police Moroney

As part of the program inaugurated for greater safety, Harry G. Pertz of the Highland Park Citizens Safety committee will shortly begin a series of traffic surveys working under the direction of Chief of Police Ed. Moroney.

It is planned to concentrate at the beginning on the streets with the greater traffic and those bearing through traffic. At the offset therefore, Central ave. will most likely receive first attention as this street includes all of the problems of grade crossings, traffic intersections, parking, through traffic and a business street.

The survey will be conducted along the lines suggested by the National Safety council and to include information asked for by Franz J. Romeis Safety Engineer Division of Highways, State of Illinois. All of this however will be adapted to the more accurate knowledge of local conditions and study of problems which has been made by Chief of Police Ed. Moroney.

Mayor William Dooley and Chief Moroney have assumed a leadership along the north shore in accepting the problem of safety, not only in the community but that Highland Park may help in the State and National movement. Working in conjunction with the Highland Park Citizens Safety committee and council established by Mayor Dooley's proclamation much can be accomplished through wholehearted cooperation.

Public cooperation in connection with the traffic surveys to be made will undoubtedly result in more valuable information and accurate knowledge of conditions. And everyone can help to give Highland Park a leadership in the movement for greater safety along the north shore.

Barrett Authorizes Dividend Payment

Edward J. Barrett, state auditor, on Monday of this week announced that he has authorized payment of a 10 per cent dividend amounting to \$48,815.53, to the depositors of the North Shore Trust Company, Highland Park, reported two weeks ago in the Press. This is the fourth dividend to be paid since the bank closed, bringing the total up to 78 per cent. The checks will be given out June 23.

In addition to this dividend, \$150,899.44 has been paid to preferred creditors.

This dividend is being paid out of funds acquired in the ordinary course of liquidation.

Ernest Ansermet to Direct Inaugural Ravinia Concert

Swiss Conductor Returns To Chicago After Absence of Twenty Years

Ernest Ansermet, most noted of contemporary Swiss conductors, to whom falls the honor of directing the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in the inaugural concert of the Ravinia Festival Season on July 3, at the reopening of the famous "Opera House in the Woods," will on this occasion make his first personal appearance with a symphony orchestra in America in twenty years.

Though he was heard on the air with the General Motors orchestra during the 1934-35 season, his last appearance in Chicago was as the orchestra director of the Diaghileff Ballet Russe in 1915, when he received special recognition for his conducting of the ballets of Stravinsky, "Petrouchka" and "The Fire Bird", in their Chicago premiere. In the course of the tours with the Diaghileff Ballet, which ranged from London and Paris through North and South America, he introduced many new works, notably those of Stravinsky, Manuel de Falla, Eric Satie, etc.

A specialist in Russian music and in the modern repertoire as inspired by the ballet, Ansermet is also well known for his interpretations of the classic symphonic literature. As symphonic conductor he has been heard with the Berlin Philharmonic, the Royal Philharmonic Society in London and Liverpool and in the larger cities of Switzerland. Since 1923 he has directed the summer concerts of the Philharmonic orchestra in Buenos Aires, and more recently he has established himself as Mexico City's leading symphony director.

Mr. Ansermet will conduct the first three concerts of the Ravinia Festival, the evening concerts of July 3 and 4, and the special matinee of Sunday, set at an early hour to enable the maestro to board the evening plane for Hollywood where he is to conduct the Bowl concert of the following Tuesday. His appearance at the Hollywood Bowl will be followed by a number in San Francisco.
