Democrats To Hold County-Wide Rally at Dietz's Stables

"I Want Roosevelt Again," will be the battle cry of the individual Democrats in Lake county, as well as other cities and counties in the United States, who will join the movement in a national demonstration cooperating with the National Democratic Convention at Philadelphia on Saturday, June 27, when President Roosevelt will personally and formally accept the Democratic nomination for re-election as President of the United States.

In 1932 Nominee Franklin D. Roosevelt broke a precedent by going before the Democratic National Convention at Chicago to receive the nomination for President the day it was made, and to respond from the convention platform with his speech of acceptance.

In 1936 President Franklin D. Roosevelt will break another precedent, when, on receiving notification on his renomination by the Democratic National Convention at Philadelphia, he will deliver his address of acceptance in the open air at Franklin Field before the Convention itself and a gigantic rally of Democrats. He would appear before 15,000 delegates and spectators if he spoke in Convention hall. At Franklin Field he will be looking into the faces of 100,000 people when he lifts his voice for them and the listening millions everywhere in the land to hear him open the Democratic National campaign.

A county-wide demonstration will be held at Dietz's Stables Saturday evening, June 27, where promptly at 10 p.m. will be heard the acceptance speech of the nomination of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, to again lead the nation to victory in November.

"It is estimated that about 12,000 people will join us in this demonstration, as a token of the high esteem and favorable expressions of approval the Lake county citizens hold for Franklin D. Roosevelt," said Dr. B. R. Bosworth, general chairman.

Dietz's stables will be wired inside and out, with sound carrying amplifiers, so that all can hear President Roosevelt's acceptance speech.

The demonstration will be the largest political gathering in the history of Lake county. All Lake county citizens, regardless of political affiliations are invited to join in this occasion.

Under the general chairmanship of Dr. Bosworth, large committees have been appointed, who will cooperate with him in his desire that the Democratic undertaking shall be a success.

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AN ORDINANCE
TERMED THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL, IN WHICH THE CORPORATE AUTHORITIES DO APPROPRIATE SUCH SUMS OF MONEY WHICH MAY BE DEEMED NECESSARY TO DEFRAY ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND ALL LIABILITIES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING THE FIRST DAY OF MAY, A. D. 1936, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTIETH DAY OF APRIL, A. D. 1937, AND SPECIFYING THE OBJECTS AND PURPOSES FOR WHICH SUCH APPROPRIATION WERE MADE, TOGETHER WITH THE AMOUNT APPLICABLE FOR EACH OBJECT OR PURPOSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

Section 1. That the following sum or sums of money, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes herein specified, to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities, and for all corporate purposes of the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois, for the fiscal year beginning the first day of May, A. D. 1936, and ending on the thirtieth day of April, A. D. 1937:

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
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
