



The RECIPE BOX

Salads... while only recently I gave you a number of them, it seems that my readers want more. These warm evenings and lunches create a demand for something light and salads usually always stand out from the rest of the meal and the family generally has a word of praise for them.

Salads are not difficult to make, even those which you have admired in tea shops, restaurants and hotels, you might even inject some of your own ideas into the next one. Variation of fruits and vegetables, when some particular kind is objectionable makes delightful changes and creates satisfaction among the family and guests.

Banana Salmon Salad 3 bananas, diced, cup 1/2 diced canned pineapple, (about 2 slices) 1/4 cup celery, diced 1/2 teas. salt 1/2 cups cooked salmon Mayonnaise to moisten.

Mix bananas and pineapple together. Pineapple prevents discoloration of bananas. Add other ingredients and mix well. Serve on lettuce and garnish with chopped olives or sweet pickles and additional mayonnaise, if desired. Serves six.

Salad Supreme 1 head lettuce 1 Calavo or avocado 1 large grapefruit 2 large oranges 1 package cream cheese 1 small bottle cherries

Crisp the lettuce, and separate on a platter. Section the grapefruit and oranges, peel the Calavo or avocado and cut in sections. Arrange the fruit on lettuce leaves, in single portions and marinate with fruit juice. Garnish with cream cheese balls (to which chopped maraschino cherries have been added.

Serve with fruit salad dressing. Make 6 portions.

Fruit Salad Dressing 1 tbslp. butter 1/2 cup sugar 1 orange, rind and juice 1 lemon, rind and juice 3 egg yolks

Cook in double boiler until mixture coats the spoon. When cool add 1/2 pint whipped cream.

Beet Salad 2 bunches beets 1/2 cup vinegar 1/2 teas. salt 2 slices of onion 1/2 teas. dry mustard 3 cloves 3 hard cooked eggs 1 teas. sugar Lettuce

Cook beets, peel, slice and cover with hot vinegar in which the seasoning has been stirred. Let stand over night. Serve cold on lettuce with sliced eggs. Pass mayonnaise with this salad.

Pineapple and Apricot Salad Place a slice of pineapple on crisp cold lettuce, with three apricot halves at regular intervals on the pineapple. Fill the cavity of each apricot and the center of the pineapple with mayonnaise forced through a pastry tube to make rosettes.

And by the way, homemakers, I've found that having an ample supply of Libby's evaporated milk on hand, comes in mighty handy, especially when the fresh milk supply is low, and you want to make something in a hurry and don't want to run to the store, because you forgot to mark the milk card for additional milk. I use evaporated milk diluted, the same as fresh milk; in the place of cream and frequently whip it to a very satisfactory degree.

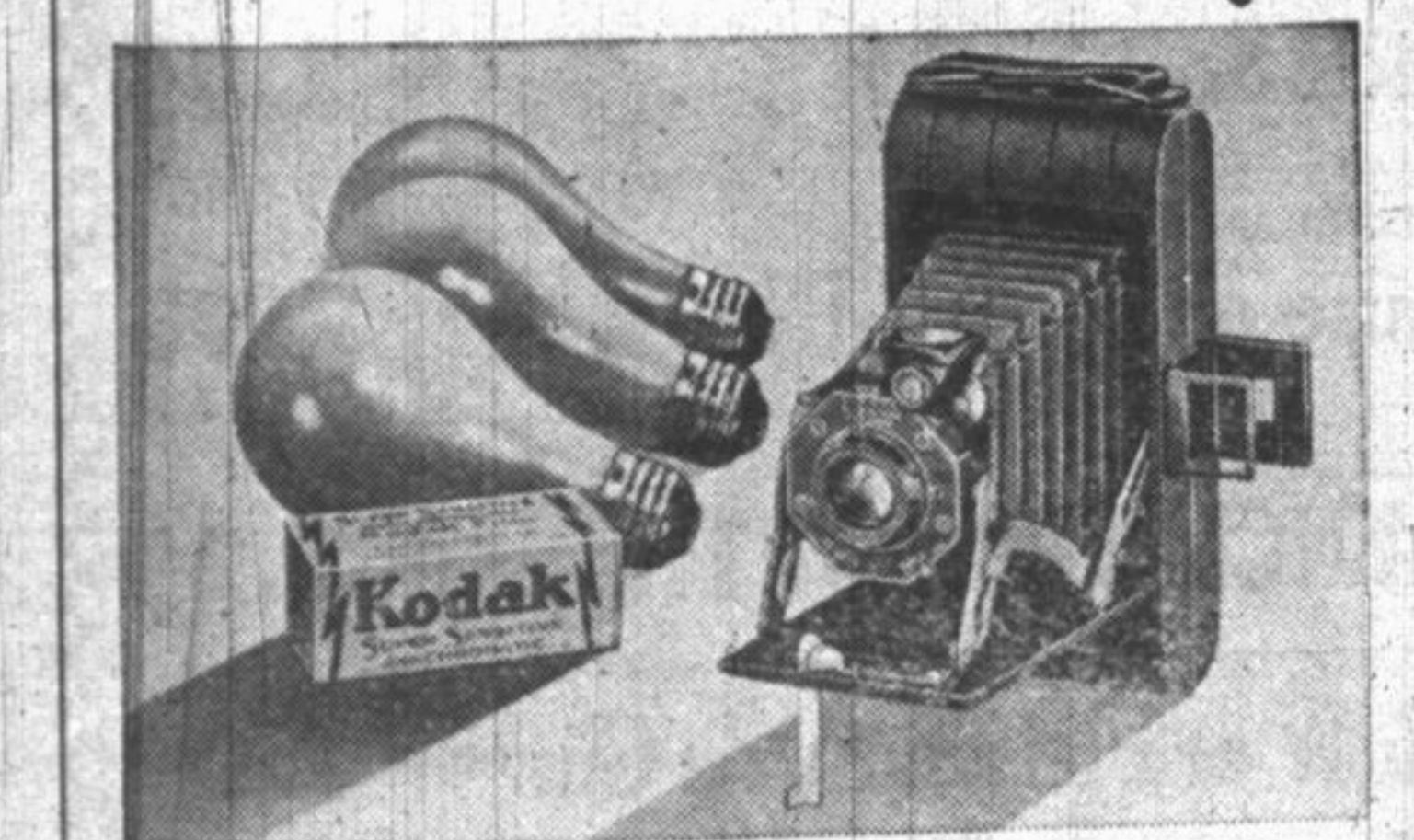
