

## ENLARGE PROGRAM OF ACTIVITIES AT PLAYGROUNDS

### Attendance and Co-operation Make Possible a Program of Wide Scope

Because of the fine attendance and cooperation on the playgrounds this season the playground staff of the Park Board of Highland Park has been able to arrange a more comprehensive and interesting program of activities than ever before. Every week finds some new activity started and being enjoyed by the children as well as the adults of the community.

In order to prepare for these feature activities, Tuesday and Thursday afternoons have been set aside on the program schedule as the times to emphasize these activities. Volleyball, tennis, badminton, horse-shoes, and other games that have been somewhat slighted the first several weeks, in favor of a program consisting in the most part of group games, have now been added to the selection of activities and children may be found on the playgrounds at any time playing and receiving instruction in these games.

The playground swimming classes held for all the playgrounds at Central and Roger Williams beaches every Wednesday and Friday morning have proved unusually successful this summer, making the objective of the staff, that of teaching every child registered on the playgrounds the fundamentals of swimming before the season closes, seem more possible of being fulfilled than ever before. There is still time for the children of Highland Park who are not as yet taking advantage of these classes to participate. All that is necessary is that the children either report to the instructors on the playgrounds or come directly to either of the two beaches on these mornings.

## JUNE BUILDING TOTAL HIGHEST IN FIVE YEARS

### Local Building Construction Totals \$260,803 During Month of June

With 35 building permits covering construction of an estimated value of \$260,803, Highland Park's building during the month of June totaled more than during any month since September 1930, according to Building Inspector Sidney Morris. 17 permits were issued a year ago for the then estimated \$59,862 valuation. June 1936 saw 15 permits amounting to \$67,020 issued. Comparison of building reports over a period of the last ten years shows that June's report compares favorably with building in the so-called "boom" years.

## PWA COOPERATION HIGHLY PRAISED BY JOHN OLIVER

### President of N. S. Sanitary District Cites Help Extended

In his \$1,136,000 construction program the North Shore Sanitary District has found its experience with the Public Works administration to be of great help, John Oliver, president of the district, told the annual convention of the Illinois Association of Sanitary Districts.

"We have been working now under PWA supervision for over a year and I can state the result of our experiences," Mr. Oliver said. "The district will receive from PWA \$344,000 which is a generous financial aid. Our relations with PWA have been pleasant and agreeable, and I can definitely say that PWA organization has been of assistance to us financially; has cooperated with our engineers toward the more careful inspection of the work, and has assisted in the settling of disputes between the contractors and labor organizations."

"In every department, from Mr. Carl H. Butler, state director, to their resident engineer inspectors on the job, we have received courteous and intelligent cooperation. The PWA organization certainly has been of real help to us."

As an experiment, Mr. Oliver told the convention, the Waukegan and Winthrop Harbor projects of the district were set up so that they could be built either with or without PWA aid. Bids were asked for these jobs both as PWA projects and district projects. The bids submitted were the same, demonstrating that contractors charge no more for PWA projects, with their rigid inspection, than for projects not so sponsored.

With Public Works Administration aid, the district has built an intercepting sewer at Waukegan, and is building at that city, a treatment plant, which is sixty per cent completed. An outfall sewer and treatment plant was built at Winthrop Harbor. This spring work started on an addition to the Highwood plant which will double its present capacity, and a new plant at Ravine drive, Highland Park.

The Public Works Administration was organized by Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes, who is a resident of Winnetka. First organization of its kind in the world, it developed and successfully carried through an enormous program of Public Works. Since 1933 it has allotted \$1,445,149,626 for non-federal construction projects, such as that of the North Shore Sanitary District.

In Illinois, PWA has made allotments totalling \$115,321,033 for 436 projects with an estimated construction cost of \$163,863,940. Its program has provided substantial and useful public works and has contributed notably to the revival of industry and the increase of employment, both for construction men on the jobs and the workers who produce and transport the materials used.

## HANS LANGE TO CONDUCT THIS WEEK'S CONCERTS

### Conductor of New York Philharmonic Orchestra To Be Here This Week

Hans Lange, conductor of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, will be the guest conductor for the second week of the Ravinia Festival, appearing Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings at 8:30 and Sunday afternoon at 4:30.

Mr. Lange was born in Constantinople of German parentage. At eighteen he made his debut as soloist with the Berlin Philharmonic orchestra, and two years later was engaged as concertmaster at the Frankfurt Museum concerts under Wilhelm Mengelberg. He came to New York in 1923 as assistant conductor and concert-master of the New York Philharmonic orchestra, and since 1931 has been a regular conductor of this orchestra.

Mr. Lange is known as a scrupulous musician, an instinctively fine program maker, and a conductor of grace and assurance. His performances of Brahms are especially noteworthy, and Ravinia patrons will have the opportunity to judge for themselves, as he will present the cycle of four Brahms symphonies in his programs. Offering a wide range of emotional and musical content, the four great symphonies of the master, Brahms, are rarely heard in the cycle form, and afford an unusual opportunity to all lovers of great symphonic music.

During the festival season soloists will be chosen from the leading members of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, among whom will be Joseph Vito and his virtuoso harp; John Weicher, first chair violin, and Daniel Saldenberg, assistant musical director of the park, who has just resigned his position as first cellist of the orchestra to pursue his bent as a conductor.
