Railroad Week Events To Start July 13

Chicago - Preparation for Chicago's part in the second annual "Railroad Week," which will be ob-Prayer and Bible study hour. served in 500 cities and towns throughout the West July 13th to 18th, inclusive, got under way here this week with the appointment of Fidder, hostess. a local committee headed by L. H. McCormick, assistant general passenger agent of the Rock Island rail-

Handcar derbies, train crier's contests, redcap races, dances, parades and a multitude of other features are included in the preliminary plans, as outlined by the committee in a report to Harry G. Taylor, Chairman of the Western Association of Railway Executives.

"Chicago, the largest railroad terminal in the world, will, as last year, be the center of many activities destined to focus the public eye on the achievements of the Western Railroads," said Chairman McCormick

"The importance of the railroads to Chicago is unlimited. 83 thousand employees in this city represent an annual payroll of 150 million dollars, and 60 thousand passengers are handled daily at our railroad stations." "Certainly," he added, "this affords ample justification for the railroads to call upon the people of this city to join in celebrating the second observance of "Railroad Week."

Other prominent railroad men serving on this committee are L. W. Bade of the Wabash, C. C. Elrick of the Aton, W. E. Fuller of the Burlington, J. V. Lanigan of the Illinois Central, J. R. Moriarty of the Santa Fe. H. R. Sampson of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois, B. J. Schilling of the Milwaukee, R. Thomson of the Northwestern, F. W. Urbahns of the Soo Line, J. K. Tully of the Pullman Company, and E. S. Buckmaster of the Railway Express Agency.

The opening of "Railroad Week" will be signalized at 8 a.m. Monday morning, July 13th, when a chorus of 18 thousand locomotive whistles join in one mighty serenade throughout the West. Following this, activities, which include active participation of such organizations as Chamber of Commerce, Rotary clubs, Lions, Kiwanis, American Legion posts, and other business and social organizations of this character, have been planned for the en-

Prominent among the organizations which will take a leading part in the Chicago celebration is the newly formed Association of Railroad Booster clubs which embodies the employee groups of the principal railroads serving this area. This association, headed by Frank S. Patterson, chairman, of the Milwaukee roadroad, has made tentative plans for two huge railroad balls to be held on, the north and south sides of Chicago opening night of "Railroad Week."
