

### News from Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan

North Shore Area Boy Scouts at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan on Wednesday night enjoyed a moonlight game of Capture the Flag. One team composed of Shawnee, Cheyenne, and Chippewa villages opposed Blackfoot, Menominee, and Delaware villages. The game was won at 9:30 when the latter villages succeeded in capturing the other's flag.

On the same evening the Blackfoot village enjoyed a feast of ice cream provided by Clifton G. Speer, Scout executive, for having the largest attendance at camp of any Scout troop in the council. The troop is from Christ church in Winnetka and has a total attendance from the troop of 37 Scouts and Scouters. This is the largest enrollment at camp from any single troop since Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan was established eight years ago.

Chef Bob Paulson provided a special treat for the campers Tuesday night when he served stuffed pork chops. This was a big job for two cooks were served for each of the nearly 200 persons in camp.

Metal work under Harry Bolle received added impetus to its already big start during the rain of Monday and Tuesday. The handicraft tent was crowded to more than capacity all during the rainy periods.

The construction work of the archery department is also done in the handicraft tent under the supervision of David Morris, teacher of history at Lake Forest academy. Mr. Morris's father was, at one time, archery champion of the United States, and Mr. Morris as a consequence has much to offer in the way of help to followers of the ancient sport.

Thursday night an Indian ceremonial camp fire was held at the council ring, where stories were told of the first inhabitants of the country and some of their ceremonial dancing displayed by the followers of Indian lore the class which is taught by Bob Bowditch, famous authority on Indian lore in the middle west.

Monty Joyce, the G-man who always gets his man because he is a "Monty" is organizing a Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan unit of the famous force. Each member will be provided with a police star and an opportunity to do some sleuthing.

The Blackfoot village held an unusual camp fire Tuesday night, when they followed the sound of a phantom horn to their council fire deep in the virgin wood surrounding the camp.

Friday inaugurated the Red and Blue war, three days of intense competition. The entire camp is divided into two units, and during the period of competition will wage battle in scouting tests, track meet, baseball capture the flag, water meet and will end with a stunt fight at which each village will put on an original act of some sort or other.

The finale of the week will be the fireworks display over the waterfront on the evening of 4th of July. The largest supply of fireworks ever assembled in camp in celebration of the National Birthday has been obtained, including some mammoth floral displays of fire, and including the usual rockets, sky bombs, etc.

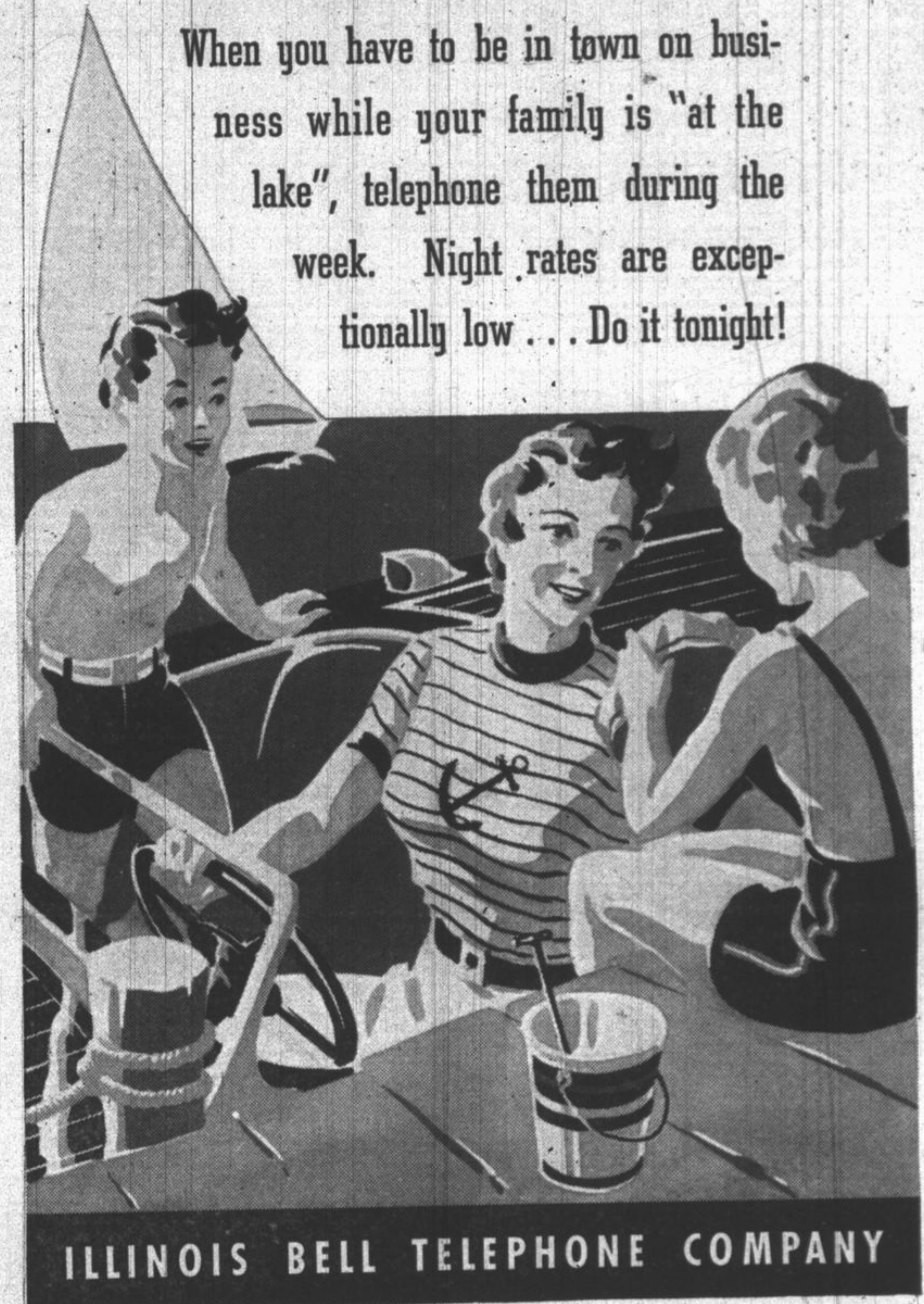
