

H. P. Community Chest Aids Infant Welfare in Carrying on Work

Money Given to Society Provides Medical Care for Less Fortunate

One of the charitable organizations to which the Highland Park Community Chest devotes part of its funds is the Infant Welfare Society of Chicago. Money given to this society is used entirely to provide medical care and home health education by nurses, doctors, and nutritionists and a mental hygiene supervisor for expectant mothers and children up to six years of age. The work is carried on in the poorest district of Chicago where children are most exposed to the hazards of poor housing, inadequate food and sub-standard living conditions.

During the first six months of 1936 the Infant Welfare Society had 11,347 prospective mothers, infants and pre-school-age children under its care. The Highland Park Community Chest funds are given to the society through its Highland Park-Ravina center for the support of Alice H. Wood station at 1964 North Halsted Street. A report of the use which has been made during the first half of this year of the money received from our community chest discloses that at this station from January 1 to June 30, 1936, the society cared for 1303 mothers and children; there were 8846 medical examinations and conferences with doctors in the station and the nurses and nutritionists made 6288 home visits.

An indication of the success of the Infant Welfare Society in assuring the health of its children is contained in the infant death rate at Alice H. Wood station during this six-month period: there were only two infant deaths or a death rate of 2.7 per thousand babies cared for to a death rate for all Chicago babies in 1935 of 40 per thousand live births. By the same token it is safe to assume that the children who survive have been benefited and the health level of the whole family raised to a marked degree.

The cost to the Infant Welfare Society is only \$12 a year for each child whom it keeps in health — an insignificant sum compared to the cost of allowing children to become sick and then trying to effect a cure.

Prohibition Party Circulate Petitions to Get on Ballot

25,000 Signatures Must Be Secured Before Sept. 14. Candidates Visit Vicinity

The Prohibition Party is again circulating petitions for their national and state tickets. It is necessary for all parties except the Republican and Democratic parties to secure 25,000 signatures before September 14 in order that their state and national tickets may have a place on the official ballot next fall. The Prohibition Party filed sufficient signatures two years ago and will again this year, according to State Chairman Leo F. Jeannene, who made the following statement with reference to the situation:

"Because of an unjust and un-American law, the Prohibition Party, with other minority parties, is compelled to secure the signatures of 25,000 voters to get on the Illinois official ballot.

"We secured the signatures two years ago and will again this year. The growing reaction against the liquor conditions and the growing lack of confidence in the old parties will increase our following this year. We are gaining many recruits from the ranks of youth and are having enthusiastic youth rallies."

A number of the party candidates are conducting an auto campaign tour of the state, meeting community leaders personally and laying plans for the circulation of petitions. About 50 counties have been visited in this manner. Candidates report much more cordial and friendly feeling toward the party than in any previous year. They report that the newspapers of the state as well as voters in general have treated their campaign in a friendly and dignified manner. The two candidates who are visiting in this section are Mrs. Harriet L. McBride of River Forest, candidate for secretary of state, and Dr. Mildred E. Young of Chicago, candidate for trustee of the University of Illinois.

Mrs. McBride has never previously voted the Prohibition ticket and expressed herself in this manner regarding her connection with the party:

"I am voting the Prohibition ticket for the first time this year, and am very proud to have found such a fine party in which to work. We do not stand only for Prohibition but for re-establishment of the government by the decent people. We invite people who do not think more of their party affiliation than they do of their nation's welfare to unite with us.

"As a conscientious wife and mo-

ther, I believe it is up to the women in order to preserve their homes, that they put over the program of the Prohibition party. We are not politicians, we are statesmen."

Dr. Young made the following statement:

"As Trustee of the University of Illinois, I would stand by the sound basic teachings that have made the university such a power for good throughout the past years.

"The young citizens from our university will largely determine the character of the commonwealth.

"I would seek the eradication of all subversive teachings and to prevent the spread of communistic influence in the university."

The Illinois Prohibition committee has held a considerable number of youth dinner rallies, one result of which has been to greatly increase the number of young people interested in the Prohibition cause. It is planned that some time within a few months a Lake County youth dinner rally will be held under this auspices, probably in Libertyville.

Dr. Charles N. Dubs Dies July 9 in China

Dr. Charles Newton Dubs, well known to many residents of this city, ended an eventful and distinguished career as a Missionary to China on July 9. A cablegram stated that the funeral services were held on July 11. Dr. Dubs has spent most of his life as a Missionary for the Evangelical Church in the East Hunan Province. As a young minister he left Highland Park to take up the work in China which opened at that time. The work grew rapidly under his leadership, and after a number of years the Evangelical church appointed him to be the Superintendent of the China Mission which position he held up to a few years ago, when his health became poorly. He maintained his church membership in the Bethany Evangelical church in this city and kept in close touch with a number of his friends in Highland Park these many years. The members of the Bethany church, assembled for worship last Sunday, formulated a resolution of sympathy which has been sent to Mrs. Dubs.

Msgr. T. F. Quinn Former Priest at Deerfield Passes on

Heart Attack Is Fatal. Funeral Held Saturday. Interment at Calvary

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Quinn, pastor of St. Sylvester church, Humboldt boulevard and Palmer square, died Tuesday at St. Anthony hospital after a heart attack. He was born in Ireland 63 years ago.

Msgr. Quinn was educated at St. Pius school, 19th street and Ashland avenue, St. Ignace college, and at St. Mary's seminary of the Sulpician fathers in Baltimore, Md. He was ordained by the late Cardinal Gibbons in Baltimore and became assistant pastor of St. Charles Borromeo church there. On coming to Chicago he served St. Catherine church in Austin.

In 1909 Father Quinn came to the parishes of Everett and Deerfield. Neither community had a Catholic church. The one at Everett had been destroyed by fire and Deerfield had not been large enough previously to organize a parish. While the two

churches and the rectory (in Everett) were being built, classes were held in the big living room of the John C. Ender home and the Rev. Father Quinn lived in the Duffy home just south of the present Deerfield church. In 1916 Father Ryan succeeded him and Father Quinn went to St. Mary's church in Joliet before becoming pastor of St. Sylvester church 15 years ago. He was made a papal chamberlain with the title of monsignor in 1928.

Msgr. Quinn was active in the arrangements of the International Eucharistic congress in 1924 and was a leader of the Knights of Columbus. Funeral services were held at St. Sylvester's on Saturday morning with Cardinal Mundelein presiding.

Interment was made in Calvary. Msgr. Quinn was the son of the late Francis and Mary Quinn, brother of Edward, Mrs. Stepany, Miss

Margaret Quinn of Ireland, Anna Marie, Bride, and Mrs. P. J. Duffy of Deerfield, Ill., and the late Rev. Francis P. and Maurice.
