Road Workers Return to Work Wednesday

Work on the Skokie road project in Lake Forest was at a standstill last Monday and Tuesday, due to a strike of nearly 500 laborers, and caused by a controversy between Tony Rossi, of Highwood, business agent of the Hod Carriers' Building and Common Laborers' union and Michael Carozzo, head of the street laborers in Chicago.

Laborers who had been deprived of work said that the controversy had been settled with Rossi coming out victorious. Rossi claimed that Carozzo was making an effort to invade Lake county by allegedly calling a strike of hoisting engineers and truck drivers. The walk-out of these workers on the highway projects tied up the operations of the laborers.

Deerfield Board Passes Tax Levy

The annual tax levy for the fiscal year May 1, 1936, to April 30, 1937, was adopted by the Deerfield village trustees at the July meeting last Tuesday evening. The levy for this period amounts to \$26,690.00. The summary is:

French Dressing
4 teaspoons sugar
1 tablespoon salt
1 tablespoon paprika
1 cup salad oil
1/2 cup vinegar
