

**Lake Zurich Summer Theatre to Present "The Factory Girl"**

The Lake Zurich Summer theater rose far above the usual level of local play production last Sunday in its presentation of "Sun Up." Myrtle Bigden Driscoll was again presented as guest artist and the stark realism of her interpretation of the Widow Cagle left the audience breathless.

With John Driscoll as director, and Mrs. Driscoll playing occasionally as guest artist, this interesting group is attracting wide attention and gets many inquiries from little theater players who are eager to get a few weeks' intensive experience. The company builds its own sets and presents a different play each week-end. So far this year it has given plays only on Sunday nights but later in the season plans to give several performances of each bill.

As a relief to the pent up emotions of "Sun Up", next Sunday's bill will be "The Factory Girl" which is described as a "soul stirring melodrama of the nineties." Following the traditions of the 19th Century American School of Drama, the cast will include the wronged heroine, the valiant leading man, the arrogant "female heavy" and the oily villain.

Mrs. Driscoll will make another guest appearance—this time in a broad comedy role. The theater is located in the old "Dixie Inn" on Route 22 near the "sea-wall" in Lake Zurich and the curtain is at 8:00 p.m.

**Dedicatory Service at Ft. Sheridan**

A massive stone arch as a memorial to Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, founder of the Citizens Military Training camps was dedicated Tuesday at the Patriots Day ceremonies held at Ft. Sheridan. Maj. Gen. Chas. E. Kilbourne, commander of the Sixth Corps area, gave the dedicatory address. There were about five hundred visitors and the 900 members of the C.M.T.C. present.

The archway, which stands at the entrance to the C.M.T.C. camp area, was built by men of the army post, under the auspices of the Chicago Historical society and the Military Training Camps association. It consists of two columns, each six feet square, placed twenty feet apart, and is surmounted by an entablature with its base twenty feet above the ground.

**Bronze Tablet Describes Site**

A bronze tablet bears the information that the site was that of the Business and Professional Men's camps in 1915, and the first and second Officers' Training camps in 1917. Gen. Kilbourne, in his address, reviewed briefly the career of Gen. Wood, who was born in New Hampshire in 1860, joined the army in 1885, and died in 1927 while he was governor general of the Philippines. During the Spanish-American war Gen. Wood commanded the "Rough Riders" which he organized with Theodore Roosevelt.

**E. Kuhn Kills Self; Funeral Saturday**

Funeral services for Edward J. Kuhn, 38, who ended his life by hanging himself, Wednesday night, in the county jail at Waukegan, were held Saturday afternoon, in the H. F. Kelley chapel, on 29 North Sheridan road. Burial was in North Shore cemetery.

Kuhn had been ordered sent to the asylum at Elgin after a sanity hearing last Wednesday and was lodged in the county jail to await final written orders. He was found early the next morning in his cell with the legs of his trousers tied around his neck.

A week previous he had tried to take his life by monoxide gas, but was discovered by his wife, who called the police and firemen who saved his life. His death was attributed to failing health.

He leaves a wife and two small children to survive him.
