

Deerfield Citizens Approve Relief Work

Attorney Harold Norman of Bancroft acted as chairman of a meeting held last Wednesday evening in the West Deerfield Town Hall in the Village of Deerfield. Mr. Norman, who was also chairman of the advisory investigating committee for the way relief is handled in the township, read the report of his committee.

The seven members had investigated thoroughly the recent relief legislation and its effects on local relief problems, they studied the accounting control over relief disbursements, the three mill tax recently levied and the amount of income West Deerfield Township will derive from the state supervision of local relief and the method of the township in distribution of relief.

The advisory committee commended Supervisor James O'Connor for his method of confining relief to orders for merchandise, rent and services, rather than giving cash. They recommended that poor relief funds be kept in a separate account and that all applicants for relief be required to make notarized affidavits of their circumstances before relief is given. To expedite the execution of application, Mrs. Ruth R. Pettis, assistant to the supervisor, was made a notary public. There will be monthly meetings of the township board of auditors which includes the town clerk (Mrs. Theresa Petersen), the supervisor, and two justices of the peace, to approve all poor relief. All able bodied applicants will be required to render some service to the township in return for relief furnished.

Members of Mr. Norman's committee were Frank Burroughs, A. J. Pearson, Erwin Seago, Mrs. Agnes Tennerman, Mrs. Marshall Doty and Henry Clifford Hawes. The last paragraph of their detailed report is as follows: "Both the supervisor, James O'Connor, and Mrs. Pettis have cooperated with the committee in supplying information for this report. We are of the opinion that they are conscious of their responsibilities and that relief is being administered in accordance with the law and the interest of the taxpayers."

Laurel Ave. Drainage Progressing Rapidly

Work is progressing rapidly on the Laurel avenue storm sewer which is being tunneled under the North Shore tracks to connect with the Laurel avenue sewer. With the installation of the new sewer, there should be no more danger of floods under this viaduct, which has happened so frequently in the past during a bad storm. Repairing of sidewalks and roadway under the viaduct will add much to the improvement of the city.

Materials for the installation of a new storm sewer on Central avenue have been delivered this week, and by the looks of things work on the repaving of Central avenue will be started soon. A ten inch sewer is to be laid at Green Bay road, gradually increasing in size to a twenty-four inch sewer at the foot of Central avenue hill. The street will be widened to 43 feet from curb to curb.

Donkey Ball Game Draws Large Crowd

Amid the hilarious laughter of a crowd ranging in the neighborhood of a thousand people, a team composed of local merchants, shut out the American Legion ball team by the score of 3-0 in a donkey ball game Wednesday night, July 30.

This unique variation of baseball took place in Sunset Park under the lights. The game drew the largest attendance of any sports event held in the park since the beginning of the current year.

As is the usual case, when youth meets its elders in any sort of athletic competition, the Legion outfit was over-confident. This, however, was not the only thing responsible for the Legion's defeat. It was quite obvious that the finish of the contest had been premeditated.

There were four burros used to ride around the bases. Of these four there was only one that could be made to reach first base. Two of the others were trained to stop at a white line about five feet from the

first sack. No amount of wicking in the ribs or beating would act as a persuader once the beasts had halted. The fourth, a harmless-looking creature, would stand patiently by while its next victim did his bit with the bat. As soon as the batter hit the ball and attempted to mount the little mule would instantly become a bucking broncho. Perhaps it was only a coincidence, but the Legionnaires were only favored by the use of the one good base running steed when the score book showed two outs against them. This situation predominated thruout the entire conflict, affording little chance for the Legion boys to score.

The most sensational play of the game and seemingly the most entertaining for the spectators was performed by Eddie Rogan, Legion catcher, when he managed to ride the bucking broncho as far as first base. After the battle was over, Rogan's team mates wanted to carry him from the field on their shoulders but Eddie's modesty forced him to refrain from taking part in such a demonstration.
