EDITORIAL

Heine wrote, "There is something marvelous in music. I might almost say it is, in itself, a marvel. Its position is somewhere between the region of thought and that of phenomena; a glimmering medium between mind and matter, related to both and yet differing from either, spiritual and yet requiring rhythm; material, and yet independent of space."

The Ravinia Festival of symphonic music has for the past five weeks brought to the citizens of Highland Park and other music lovers, those marvelous and intangible qualities of music described by Heine. All of the 50,000 persons who attended the concerts were benefited — spiritually and culturally — by the harmonies produced by the Chicago Symphony orchestra under the leadership of the guest directors.

The desirability of Highland Park, or any other community, as a place to live is largely in ratio to the civic pride of its citizens. The Ravinia Festival has been more than a feast of music. It has been an event by which every citizen, regardless of his interest in music, added to his store of civic pride.

Anything which gives citizens an opportunity to work side by side in a common cause has, by the same logic, a civic value. So another item must be entered in the ledger as a credit to the Ravinia Festival.

Those who did the excellent work which made the Festival an outstanding success inevitably received the greatest benefits. They undoubtedly secured the maximum enjoyment from the music. They have the satisfaction of having completed a worthwhile accomplishment. They have the knowledge of having unselfishly contributed to the making of a better Highland Park.

Every citizen owes to these conscientious workers a debt of gratitude. Such debts are paid by expression. The PRESS pays its debt now by saying to Francis Knight, Howell Murray, Renslow Sherer, Howard Will, Charles Henkle and all the others who contributed their talents, "Well done and thank you."

William Chambers Wins C of C Trophy at Waukegan Aug. 1

William Chambers of the Sunset Valley Golf club, Highland Park, successfully defended the Lake county amateur golf championship Saturday at the Bonnie Brook club, Waukegan, and took home the Chamber of Commerce trophy, symbolic of the title, for one year.

Art Boyke and Leo Van Laeke, Bonnie Brook stars, pushed Chambers hard in the final day's play, but the ten stroke advantage gained on his home course, coupled with a neat 75 on the last 18 holes, gave the tall blonde an advantage of four strokes in the final tabulation. Chambers counted a total of 300 strokes for the 72 hole contest while Boyke and Van Laeke each notched 304. Frank Kovack of Bonnie Brook finished in fourth position with a total of 308.
