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## Edwin Gilroy Gives Detailed Report Of Legion Activities

At the installation of officers of Dumaresq Spencer Post held last Wednesday evening, retiring Commander Edwin Gilroy, presented the annual report of the local post, telling of the activities of his group for the past year. The attendance was unusually large.

The officers for the ensuing year are, Miller W. Schreiner, commander; William Heinrichs, senior vice commander; Paul Webb, Jr., junior vice commander; Saylor Shanafelt, sergeant at arms; Wilson Richardson, trustee; Joe Novotny, past state vice commander, installed the officers.

Following is the report given by Edwin Gilroy.

I wish to submit the annual report for the past year by giving a brief resume of the post's activities during that time. This report does not cover the financial statement because our financial year runs from September 1, 1935 to September 1, 1936. It is well to say, however, that as we go along from month to month few of the members realize how much money passes through this post each year, either directly or through our activities. By including the funds of the post, plus the money handled in the carnival, plus other activities such as harvest home party, card parties, etc., there was more than \$7,000 handled by the Dumaresq Spencer post during the past year. The post therefore has become a real business and a separate financial report will be rendered by our finance officers after September 1.

I shall briefly discuss our activities, taking them in the order of time at which these activities took place during the past year.

**Constitution Day**

## Mrs. Truax Refutes Old House Story; Tells Early History

In last week's issue of the Highland Park Press, under a picture of the old Nafe house, the statement was made that that house had been the oldest standing in Highland Park. The writer must have been misinformed, for it was by no means the oldest. The earliest recorded arrivals in that section speak of a log cabin found on the bluff, which cabin forms a part of the Cox house which lies between Roselyne lane and Maria st., now called Clinton ct., about the number 1026. No one knows when that cabin was built, as often one family or one man built a log cabin, lived there for a time and for some reason or another, moved on. Other families would spend a season or so in the cabin, and in their turn would abandon it, so that no record was left of previous tenants. Owen Monahan, the Lighthouse keeper of old Port Clinton, moved the cabin back to its present location, and in the late 60s or early 70s built the present additions on either side of the original cabin which now forms just one room, with entrance doors at each end. That cabin held the first church and the first school in Port Clinton.

The Chicago and Northwestern railroad was built through this section. (Continued on Page 3)

## Youth Killed And Two Hurt In Auto Accident Monday

Howard Steffy, aged 20, of 530 Maple avenue, Wilmette, was killed and his two companions were seriously injured early Monday morning, when he lost control of his automobile when his tire blew out on Green Bay road at Clavey road. Traveling at a high rate of speed, the car rolled over several times after the tire blew out.

The two companions who were injured are: Robert Fieberg, 17 years old, 330 Greenleaf avenue, Wilmette, son of Paul H. Fieberg, head of a printing concern in Chicago; and James Streeter, 17, of 302 Central avenue, Wilmette, whose father Lorenzo Streeter, is Chicago district sales manager for the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Company. James, who suffered head injuries, is improving, but Robert, whose skull was fractured, is still in a serious condition at the local hospital.

According to witnesses, all three youths were thrown out of the car as the machine rolled over and over a distance of about three hundred feet before coming to a stop in an upright position.

Dr. Donald E. Rossiter pronounced Steffy dead upon his arrival at the Highland Park hospital where all three were taken following the accident.

At the inquest held Monday afternoon by Dr. Maurice D. Penney, acting coroner of Lake county, the verdict brought in was that young Steffy came to his death while driving his automobile at a "reckless rate of speed."

Steffy was to have returned to Northwestern University as a sophomore next month. Fieberg is to enter his senior year at New Trier high school. Streeter planned to return as a senior next month to the Stearns preparatory school in Mt. Vernon, N.H.

Funeral services for the deceased are being held this afternoon at 2:30 at his home in Wilmette, with burial in Memorial Park cemetery.
