New Building Survey in Suburban Area Shows July Increase

An increase in July of nearly a million and a half dollars over the same month of last year and nearly a million dollars over June of this year is the big news of this survey of new building in the Chicago suburban region.

The figures are \$3,380,962 for July 1936 as compared with \$1,916,458 for July 1935, an increase of 71 per cent. The gain of July over June's \$2,397,138 is 41 per cent.

Homes, homes and more homes—175 of them costing \$1,572,743—make up nearly one-half of the total for July; and with alterations, additions and repairs to homes amounting to \$399,505, the total expenditure for homes is roughly two-thirds of the cost of all the building work in the Chicago region.

This is true in spite of the fact that industrial work to the amount of \$739,775 is reported by the fifty-five building commissioners contributing to this month's survey.

Two buildings of note, not of an industrial character, are reported this month; the first, by E. M. Goodman, building commissioner of Evanston being St. Athanasius Catholic Church on which construction was started under the direction of McCarthy, Smith and Eppig, architects, the permit for which is \$150,000; and the second, a \$60,000 dormitory for Wheaton College, reported by C. E. Hogeboom, city clerk of that town.

Home building seems to have become almost a craze and in the amazing revival Highland Park takes first place in July both in the number and value of its new homes, with Glencoe a close rival in value, though not in numbers. S. D. Morris of Highland Park reports seventeen new dwellings to cost \$219,286, while L. M. Heike, building inspector of Glencoe, mentions only five, but one of these is to cost \$150,000, making a total of \$212,800. The mansion is being erected for Harris Perlstein, president of the Pabst Blue Ribbon Sales Company.

W. A. Wolf of Wilmette issued permits for thirteen single family residences ranging in price from \$5,000 to \$22,000 with a total reported value of \$134,000.

In the number of new homes Markham deserves special attention as this village closely approaches Highland Park in the number of home permits issued, there being fifteen houses ranging in price from \$2,900 to \$4,350, making a total of \$52,010, reported by F. R. Snyder of the Fred J. Wash Co., which is building the homes.

It may be further noted that in the amount of permits issued in

July River Forest is far ahead of all the other communities with a total of \$706,060, due largely to the Wieboldt store, though River Forest is adding new homes each month at a remarkable rate, particularly in the northern section surrounding the recently founded church of the Dominican Fathers. Evanston's total of \$421,800, reported by E. M. Goodman, places that city in second position this month. After Evanston comes Highland Park with \$262,257, and Glencoe with \$222,700.
