**The RECIPE BOX**

Between writing these columns and writing radio script, I have been wondering, if you would prefer my giving you recipes that I give out over the air or would you prefer that I select recipes that I think you would like in this column. Why not write me in care of this paper, giving me your preference, I'll be glad to cooperate.

Its pretty near to school time again and I suppose many home-makers will start packing lunches for those youngsters at school. . . . cookies play an important part of the lunch, so today I'll give you a few recipes for them.

**Maple Cookies**  
1 cup soft grained maple sugar.  
1/2 cup butter.  
2 eggs, well beaten.  
2 teas. cream of tartar.  
1 teas. soda.  
1/2 teas. salt.

Add enough more flour to make a dough stiff enough to shape into a roll. Wrap in heavy waxed paper. Chill in refrigerator over night. Slice thin and bake in hot oven. Put a half walnut or half cherry on each cookie before baking. There is no milk in this recipe.

**Gum Drop Bars**  
Mash brown sugar thoroughly with a rolling pin, and measure 2 cups. Beat four eggs until very light, add one tablespoonful of cold water, and the brown sugar, and beat thoroughly again. Sift together two cups of flour, 1/4 teaspoonful of salt and one teaspoonful of cinnamon. Put one teaspoonful of this flour mixture into one-half cup of chopped pecan meat and one cup of sliced gumdrops assorted flavors, (but avoid licorice), stir well and sift off the excess flour. Add all the flour to the egg mixture, and finally the nuts and gumdrops. Spread in a thoroughly greased pan, about three eighths of an inch thick. Bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees F., about 30 minutes, until brown and tender, like date bars. Remove from pan, cut into strips, spread each strip with frosting and decorate top with gum drops.

**Spiced Walnut Drop Cookies**  
Mix and sift two cups of flour, one half teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one half teaspoonful of nutmeg and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Soften one half a cup of butter, add one cup of light brown sugar, closely packed in cup, one egg, one-fourth

cup of milk and one cup walnut meats, coarsely chopped. Stir the dry ingredients into the mixture. Drop by the teaspoonful on a well greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven, 375 degrees F., for about 12 minutes. If desired, some of the walnut halves may be reserved before nuts are chopped and a half pressed on the top of each cookie before it is baked.

**Date-Nut Bars**  
1 cup dates  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup flour  
1 cup nuts, chopped  
3 eggs  
2 tsp. baking powder  
2 tsp. vanilla

Beat eggs well, add sugar and beat 2 minutes, add dates and nuts ground together. Sift in flour with baking powder. Flavor. Bake in shallow pan, slowly 325 degree oven and cut into strips; roll in confectioner's sugar while still hot. Makes about 30 bars.

**Foreign War Vets Announce Special Train to Convention**

Chicago Union Labor Post No. 1277 Veterans of Foreign Wars announce a special train to the 37th National Encampment at Denver, Colo., Sept. 18-18, 1936, via the Rock Island Lines.

The train will be operated on a strictly non-profit basis. The equipment will be most modern—all steel—100 per cent air condition.

The train will arrive at Colorado Springs on Sunday, Sept. 13, and the whole day will be devoted to sight-seeing at Pikes Peak, Garden of the Gods, Manitou, Cheyenne Mountains and many other places of interest.

The train will leave Colorado Springs early Monday morning, Sept. 14, and arrive in Denver in ample time for the opening call of the convention Monday morning, Sept. 14.

The Pullman cars will be used as hotel accommodations at Colorado Springs and during the entire stay at Denver by all who accompany the Veterans on this train. This arrangement was made solely at the request of the Union Labor Veterans for accommodation of themselves and friends in order to avoid necessity of paying hotel accommodations. Rest rooms have been reserved in one of Denver's best hotels for women passengers. There will also be a recreation car and refreshments served free.

This special will be operated on an equal proportionate cost basis. Everything including meals for the extra day at Colorado Springs for as low as \$52.86.
