The committee in charge of the exhibition, under the direction of the chairman, Mrs. C. V. Nichols, has planned an interesting number of exhibits for this year's show, and each member of the club is expected to contribute two entries.

The exhibition will be held from 2 to 5 p. m. following the annual luncheon and election of officers, which will be held at "Three Acres" Tea room on Saunders road. The Garden club is extending a cordial invitation to visitors to view the flower arrangements. The exhibition classes are as follows:

Class 1—Informal dinner table for six limit 4 entries.

Class 2—Occasional table for porch or terrace with flowers or plants. Table and accessories to be furnished by exhibitor. Limit 10 entries.

Class 3—Arrangement of flowers in silver container for dining room.

Class 4—Arrangements of flowers in coffee container suitable for library.

Class 5—Arrangement of flowers in a pewter container suitable for a man's room.

Class 6—Arrangements of flowers in china or pottery container suitable for a bedroom.

Class 7—Specimen blooms. (a) Aster. (b) Zinnias. (c) Marigolds.

(All specimen blooms must be grown by exhibitors.)

The judges will be Mrs. Maurice Manderville, of Lake Bluff; Mrs. C. D. Ewer of Wilmette, and Miss Evelyn Taylor of Ravinia.

Report Progress Of Public Welfare Work In County

The Lake County Commission of Public Welfare was organized on the 14th day of February, 1936, with Mr. George D. Meyer of Mundelein as chairman, Mr. George McCullough of Gurnee as vice-chairman, and Mrs. Margaret Mason of Highland Park as a member. The commission began to accept applications for old age assistance at once and on April 1, 1936, 1,300 were enrolled in Lake county. Investigations began in the middle of March with two investigators working. During the month of April, two more were added and from that time on the Lake County Commission has worked ardently to complete its task, and is very happy to report to the interested public that on the last day of August, 1936, 735 of the original 1300 have been disposed of. This means that over one-half of the original case load has been handled and at the rate of 147 cases per month.

372 cases have been approved by the Lake County Commission and forwarded to Springfield for their approval. Of this number 172 have been approved and at the present time Lake County has 200 cases at Springfield awaiting consideration. Included in the 735 are the deferred, disapproved, transferred, deceased, and withdrawn cases. At the present time our total number of applications is 1,329, as the original number has increased gradually as applicants have reached the age of sixty-five years. At the present time the investigators in the field have contacted 319 applicants and these cases are in the process of being completed and made ready for the commission. This leaves a total of 246 cases from the original case load that have not been contacted to date.

It was the policy of the commission to handle relief cases and the oldest cases first. This has been pursued throughout the entire county and at the present time cases in Ela, Warren, Newport, Libertyville, Cuba, Wauconda, Vernon, Avon, Lake Villa, Fremont, Benton and West Deerfield townships have been practically cleaned up. There remain in the above townships only a few to see. This leaves the remaining cases to be handled in Deerfield, Shields, Antioch, Grant, Zion and Waukegan, Zion and Waukegan having the larger number.

Carney, it is reported, sped past a stop sign at a high rate of speed and crashed into the car which was driven by William Elsner of Chicago. Peterson, his wife Lorraine, 38, Mrs. Elsner, and Mr. and Mrs. August Beck, all of Chicago, were passengers in the car, and were badly injured.

With Carney were William Laffoon, the professional golfer, and Edward Eichhoff of Milwaukee. Carney and Laffoon are both assistant golf professionals at the Northmoor club.

All of the occupants of both cars were taken to the Highland Park hospital, where it is reported that Carney is in a very serious condition.

Mrs. Fred Lindstrom Passes Away Monday

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at the Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran church, the Rev. W. F. Suhr reading the service. Her body was laid to rest at the North Shore Garden of Memories.

Highland Park Schools To Open Wednesday, September 9

Books Should Be Procured Before Opening; Several New Teachers Listed

On Friday, Sept. 4, the Bookstore at the Highland Park High school will be open from 9 until 3 o'clock; on Saturday, from 9 until 12 o'clock. On these two days, students are urged to buy all necessary books before the first day of school.

On Tuesday, Sept. 8, the school expects 321 freshmen to report to the auditorium at 8:45 a. m. There class schedule will be given out. Regular classes will be held during the day.

On Wednesday all students are to report for regular classes.

The Elm Place and Greenway Road schools will open Wednesday, September 9. Children are to report to their former rooms at 9 o'clock.

The bookstore in the Elm Place school will be open on Tuesday, Sept. 8, from 9 to 12 in the morning and from 1 to 4 in the afternoon for pupils in grades 5, 6, 7, and 8, to purchase books.

The Bookstore will be open Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 9, from 12:30 until 5 o'clock for pupils in grades 1 through 4 to purchase books. Book lists may be obtained from the Elm Place office any time this week.
