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## Community Chest Second Campaign To Be Oct. 15-16

The second annual financial campaign of the Highland Park Community Chest will be conducted this fall during the twelve day period, October 15 to 26, inclusive.

Announcement of the campaign dates was made today by Cloud Wampler, president of the Community Chest, following a special meeting of the executive committee of the organization held for the purpose of setting the dates.

H. A. Zischke, Chairman. In addition to announcing the period selected for this fall's financial campaign, Mr. Wampler announced the acceptance by Herman A. Zischke of the chairmanship of the general campaign committee.

Mr. Zischke has been a resident of Highland Park for the past six years, residing until the spring in Deer Park, when he purchased his present home at 299 Moraine road. He is Chicago manager of the Union Central Life Insurance Company. He served as captain in the 5th Regiment of U. S. Marines A. E. F. from 1917 to 1919, and received the Croix de Guerre and three American citations. He has taken an increasingly active part in the civic affairs of Highland Park since selecting this community as his permanent residence, and has shown much interest in its civic and welfare needs.

"The board of directors of the Community Chest are greatly pleased to have Mr. Zischke's acceptance as chairman of the general campaign committee this fall," Mr. Wampler said. "Mr. Zischke made a splendid record as district chairman of District No. 7 in last fall's campaign and we know that this important phase of the Community Chest's work will be in able hands again this year."

**Campaign Earlier**  
"The dates for this year's campaign have been advanced several weeks over last year's dates," Mr. Wampler stated, "in order that the chest financing period may come nearer the start of the fiscal year, for which the annual budgets of the member agencies of the chest are provided. The campaign budget to be raised this fall will finance the work of the member agencies for the period October 1, 1936 through September 30, 1937."

"The budget quota to be raised in the chest campaign this fall will not be definitely known," Mr. Wampler said, "until the budget committee of the chest makes its recommendations. The committee is now considering the budgets for the next fiscal year as submitted by the various member agencies, and will make its recommendations within the next few weeks."

**Ninety Five Percent**  
Ninety-five per cent of the budget allocated to member agencies of the chest in last fall's campaign, have been said to date according to Edwin C. Jones, executive secretary of the chest. "The remaining five per cent," Mr. Jones said, "will undoubtedly be paid member agencies before September 30. Many installment payments on last fall's subscriptions are due this month and as soon as these are received we shall be able to pay the entire balance due member agencies. In view of the approaching second annual campaign of the chest, we are expecting practically all of last year's subscriptions to be paid in now promptly."

## Fred W. Rubly City Collector Dies September 2

Funeral services for Fred W. Rubly, city collector of Highland Park since 1915, were held Saturday morning at the Immaculate Conception church, Dr. J. D. O'Neill, officiating. Interment was in the As-

In respect to the memory of him, the City Hall was closed Saturday morning, and the flag on Central avenue, was at half mast. There was a police escort of the body to the cemetery, and the highways were patrolled by special police.

Mr. Rubly passed away Wednesday evening, following a several weeks illness, resulting from a stomach ailment.

Had he lived until Saturday of this week, he would have been fifty years old, for he was born September 12, 1886 in Petersburg, Va., son of the late Theresa and Fred Rubly. He spent his early boyhood in Petersburg, and when sixteen years old, came to Chicago to work. Here he remained until he was twenty-six years old.

In the spring of 1911, Mr. Rubly came to Highland Park where he was employed by Mr. Rosenow in his grocery store. On May 1, 1915, he assumed the position of city collector with the city of Highland Park, in which capacity he has served the city faithfully for the past twenty-one years.

On October 16, 1912, "Fred," as most everyone knew him, married Margaret Rockefeller, of Chicago. To this union were born four children, all of whom survive.

He was not affiliated with any organization, but devoted his whole time to his family and home. During his service to the city, which was his sixth term of office, he made a host of friends, who will mourn his loss. Those with whom he served will also feel his passing deeply, for his quiet, yet jovial and congenial nature, had endeared him to his associates.

Besides his wife, Margaret, and four children, Paul, Marianne, Dorothy, and Elizabeth, Mr. Rubly leaves three brothers, Rev. A. J. Rubly of Festina, Ia., John E. Rubly of Chicago, and Edward E. Rubly of Los Angeles, Calif., to survive him. Albert H. Rubly, another brother who resided in Highland Park, passed away December 18, 1935, with a similar sickness.

## Schools Report Large Enrollment Over Last Year

All of the public schools of Highland Park began their fall and winter terms yesterday with a large enrollment. Although all statistics were not available, each school reported an increase, with a possible further increase in the early fall, due to new people moving to Highland Park.

Deerfield-Shields high school enrolled over 300 freshmen on Tuesday, but figures for the balance of the school were not obtainable. It is thought that the number will exceed last years by a fairly large margin.

Elm Place and Green Bay schools enrollments tallied with last year's, registering 520 at Elm Place with 257 at Green Bay school. At these schools it is thought that there are very few new families represented in the district.

Lincoln, Ravinia, Braeside and West Ridge schools all are taxed to capacity. Because of the rush, the enrollment figures could not be enumerated. Next week the Press will be able to give a more detailed account of the schools' opening.

## Old Ford Upset Driver Uninjured; Other Accidents

According to reports of the local police, the bump shops in Highland Park should be doing a large volume of business. Many minor auto accidents have been reported, mainly bent fenders, bumpers, etc. However one or two were of a more serious nature, one even having a funny angle to it.

The accident which caused considerable merriment among youngsters in the south part of town occurred yesterday morning. An old Ford model "A" was being driven south on Pleasant ave., by P. W. Armstrong, 69 years old, of 891 Bluff st., Glenocoe and collided with a Pontiac at the corner of Roger Williams, driven by Milton Hallman of 628 N. Genesee st., Waukegan. Both cars were travelling at a slow rate of speed but when the impact was over the Ford was sitting in the middle of the road, bottom side up with Mr. Armstrong sitting at the wheel smoking a pipe just as though nothing had happened. According to the police, the wheels were still spinning in the air when they arrived, which sounds a little far fetched, but still makes a good story. Mr. Armstrong was uninjured, but Mr. Hallman complained of a slight injury to his shoulder.

Another accident occurred when a Buick car being driven by H. H. Doty was turning into a private drive on South Green Bay rd., was struck by a Chevrolet driven by Frank DeBellis of 228 Washington street, Highwood. No one was injured but both cars were badly damaged.
