Constitution Day to Be Observed Sept. 17

Residents of communities and suburbs of Chicago are especially invited to take part in Chicago's celebration of Constitution Day, Sept. 17, it was announced by Julius H. Miner, executive director of Chicago's Constitution Day Celebration committee.

"We want to make this year's celebration of Constitution Day a city-wide affair and a special invitation is extended to residents of communities and suburbs to attend," Mr. Miner said. "Here is one day in the year when all sections of Chicago should join together to honor our forefathers who made it possible for us to enjoy life, liberty and happiness today."

Mr. Miner announced that "Give Me Liberty—," a huge spectacle, will be staged on the Constitution Day program which is to be held in the Chicago Stadium.

Several hundred persons will take part in the spectacle, which will have as its central theme the rise of constitutional government in America.

Tableaux tracing the tyranny out of which the Constitution grew, the making of the Constitution and other famous incidents in the writing of the great American document will be presented on the huge stage of the Stadium.

Mr. Miner announced that the mammoth spectacle will be particularly fitting in its setting, the immense Stadium, where more than 25,000 persons will gather to participate in the celebration of Constitution Day.

Leo Kopp, conductor of the Chicago City Opera company, who is now in New York, will return to Chicago especially for the Constitution Day celebration and will direct the orchestra in the staging of "Give Me Liberty—." Music will be a feature of the spectacle, which will be produced with special lighting and scenic effects.

Details of the staging of the spectacle are now being worked out and will be announced within a few days, Mr. Miner stated. At the same time he will announce the name of a nationally-known speaker who will address the vast throng in the Stadium as a part of Constitution Day observance.

This is the third annual observance in Chicago of Constitution Day and, according to Mr. Miner, this year's celebration will surpass those in former years with increased enthusiasm, an augmented program and a larger number of patriotic citizens participating.

Backing up the program is a committee of 700 leading Chicago citizens, who have pledged themselves to assist in arranging the Constitution Day celebration and taking part in it.

Homer Guck will be chairman of the day and Col. R. R. McCormick will preside at the Stadium program. John A. Stevenson is secretary of the committee and James B. Forgan, vice president of the First National Bank, is treasurer.

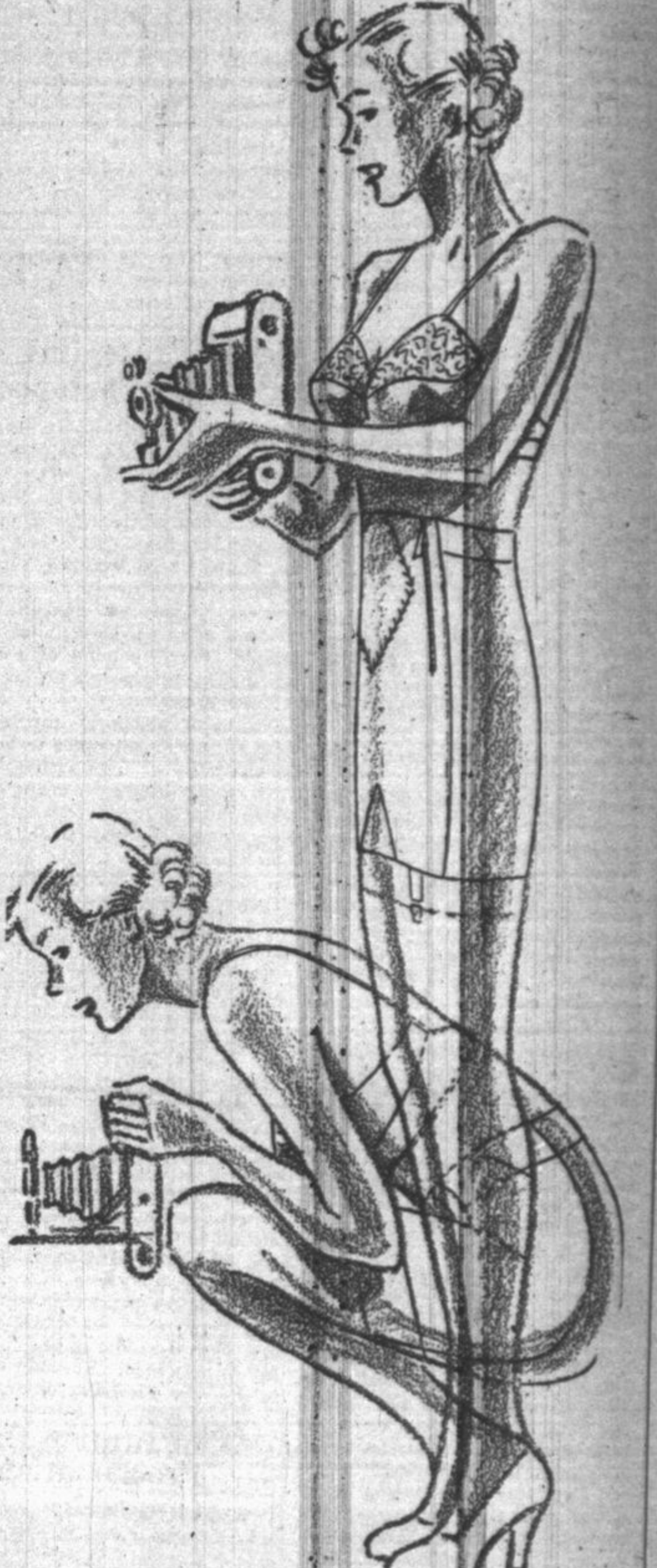

Do You Know Illinois?

Q. What cities competed with Springfield in 1934 for the privilege of being the capital of Illinois?
 A. Jacksonville, Peoria, Alton, Vandalia and the geographical center of the State, in Logan County 28 miles northeast of Springfield.
